"WHO SAID DEPRESSION"

The Stribling-Schmeling world's heavyweight championship fight dedicating Cleveland's new \$3,000,000 municipal stadium next Friday night, will be no million dollar affair, but if it draws \$400,000 there will be no walls of protest from the promoters.

This was indicated when officials of the Madison Square Garden Corporation of Ohio declared they would be "extremely satisfied" if the gate receipts hit the \$400,000 mark. Figures revealed for the first time showed \$176,000 in cash already in the bank, with \$89,000 to be added in reservations certain to be picked up.

Although the advance sale is actually \$176,000, the total advance, counting the reservations, amount to \$265,000, thus assuring financial success for the fight. The promoters hope to dispose of another \$150,000 worth of tickets between today and Friday.

If the fight draws \$300,000, which it already seems assured the Madison Square Garden Corporation will have a profit of approximately \$51,000. Stribling and Schmeling will get 52 1-2 per cent, with the champion receiving 40 per cent of this amount. The sum of \$22,000 will be paid to the city for the rental of the Stadium and \$14,000 will be spent in providing preliminaries. The Corporation will also spend \$13,000 in installing seats and another \$40,000 in promotion.

HORSE NOTES

Allan Wilson, former owner of Jeanette Royal, 2:04 3-4, who is so well known in the Provinces, was thrown from the sulky at Avon, Connecticut, Wednesday, when driving Bob Maxey, 2:07 3-4, who was run into at the first turn of the first heat, losing a sulky wheel. He escaped uninjured.

The Chicago Horse Review, in speaking of the races on the half-mile track at Mansfield, Ohio, says: "A winner that caught the critics' praise was Mamie Britten," a four-year-old, who won the 2:19 trot in straight heats in 2:12 1-2, 2:10 1-2 and which had seven starters. She is a daughter of Great Britton 2:02 1-4, the Nova Scotia Government stallion. At the same meeting a few days previous in a field of 11 starters, she stood 3-2-3 in the 2:22 trot. Hollywood Lexington, also by Great Britton, won the 2:18 trot in 2:14, 2:15 3-4, capturing the third and fourth heats.

According to sport writers in the United States, the shellacking that Max Schmeling took at the hands of down and out Natie Brown, one of his sparring partners, was more serious than the champion and his handlers gave it credit for being. According to these eye-witness scribes, the champion is still "a sucker for a left hand" and Bill Stribling is developing a stabbing portside punch especially for the fray. It looks as if Brown had a name for himself and incidentally some big money, for not only did he trim the German once but came right back the next day and repeated and one writer said it was his opinion that Maxie was trying his level best to K. O. the San Francisco heavy.

In trying to K. O. Brown, Schmeling was simply trying to repeat on the performance of Jack Dempsey, who was floored by an ambitious sparring mate in his preparation for the fight with Tom Gibbons at Shelby. Next day the Manassa Mauler taught the ambitious one a lesson and knocked him kicking with one punch. However, Maxie did no such thing to Brown. From the road it looks as if the title will be returning to this side of the pond.

Livestock Market

MONTREAL, Que., June 30.—Live stock there were 167 cattle, 509 calves, 495 hogs and 129 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. The cattle market was steady. Common butcher cows sold around \$3 and common bulls ranged from \$2.50 to \$3.25. Five loads of fairly good mixed stock just arrived and were not sold at time of writing. Twelve loads of export cattle were received and 2 loads were reported all leaving Montreal for England this week and Calves were slow. Prices ranged from \$3 for common grassers to \$6 for good quality calves. Lambs sold in mixed lots brought \$8 and \$9 was paid for good lambs with culls out at \$7.50. Sheep were slow at \$2 to \$2.50 for good handy weights. Hogs were firm at \$9.25 for bacon. Butchers and lights with odd sales at \$9.15, heavies brought around \$7.50 and sows were mostly \$5.

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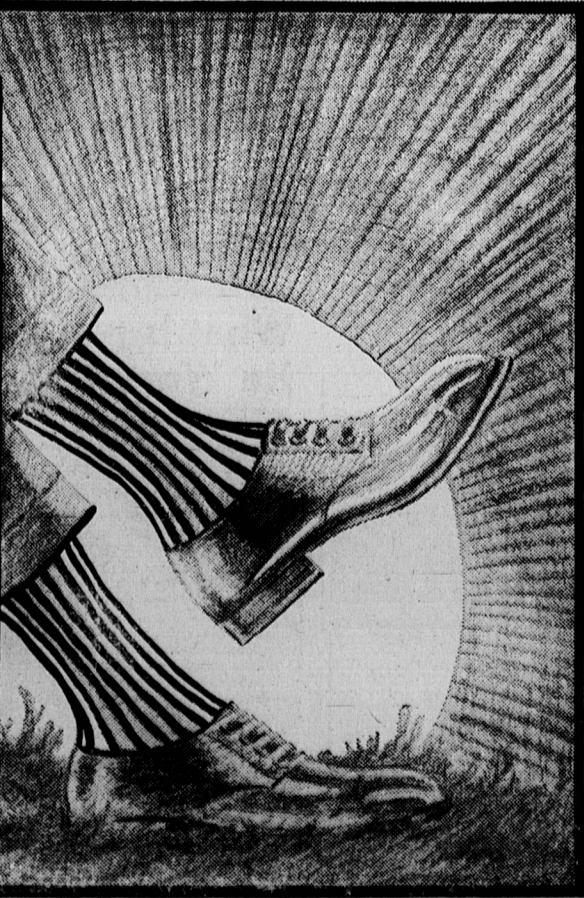
