**Sanatorium Campaign Fund**

In conversation with Mr. C. M. Williams, Campaign Manager of the present Sanatorium Drive, we learn that the fourth day of the campaign has produced a most encouraging total subscription. The most of the returns up to the present are from the city of Charlottetown and show that the citizens of this city are fully alive to the urgency of the situation and are determined that an institution for caring for our Tuberculous patients will be available in the near future. A close analysis of those contributions shows that a great many individuals have subscribed to the very limit of their financial resources. And not only are the private citizens contributing most generously but such organizations as fraternal societies, patriotic societies, etc., are doing their share.

In Charlottetown the canvassing is being done by several teams of men and several teams of women. Needless to say, the ladies' teams have already rolled up a magnificent total and are only nicely started. Three of these teams have each collected over \$1000 and all of the others are aiming at the same mark.

The returns are now beginning to come in fairly freely from the Women's Institutes of the Province and give evidence of both systematic and enthusiastic canvassing on their part. As these returns are not yet completed, the Institutes reporting from day to day, the figures are not available. Mr. Williams tells us that the average subscription from these Institutes which have reported, is well over \$100. The potato subscription idea, which was explained in these columns a few days ago, is evidently meeting with much approval throughout the country districts as these potato pledges are now coming in in considerable numbers.

Telephone reports from other sections of the Province indicate that the various local committees are doing their work well.

**THE RIPENING OF GREEN TOMATOES**

(Experimental Farms Note.)

In some sections there is a considerable demand for ripe tomatoes after the season for this crop is normally over. This requirement may successfully be met by artificially ripening the fruits indoors. Fruits that are to be ripened should be well grown, free from blemishes, such as splits in the skin, bruises or frost injury. It has been found, however, that the very green fruits will not make a desirable finished product. Therefore, the tomatoes should be as near to maturing as possible. If such fruits can be saved and stored in a moderately cool room, at about 60 to 65 degrees, they will be found to ripen nicely over a considerable period.

There are several methods of handling the fruits, among which probably the following are the best. The fruits should be wiped free of all sand and graded into near ripe and quite green and wrap them in tissue paper, after which they should be placed in a single layer on a shelf, or in baskets. Some prefer to place the fruits on the shelves or in baskets without wrapping, either method is quite satisfactory, although the fruits wrapped with paper will be found to wither less than those put to ripen without wrappers.

Then there is the ethylene gas method of ripening. This measure of ripening requires special equipment such as a gas proof room into which the fruits are packed on trays or in baskets. The gas can be used at varying concentrations, varying from one cubic foot of ethylene gas to 500 cubic feet of air, to one cubic foot of gas to 5,000 cubic feet of air. The temperature of the ripening chamber should be maintained around 65 or 70 degrees. In six days ripe tomatoes can be obtained.
