(Special to The Guardian) DIGBY, N. S., June 18.—Paul Ogilvie, a pantryman of the steamer Prince Rupert, fell off the port guard while the ship was at Digby here, this afternoon and was drowned. His body was recovered one hour later. Ogilvie was twenty years old and belonged to St. John.

(Special to The Guardian) AMHERST, June 19.—Chief Justice Townsend today sentenced Chas. Electric found guilty yesterday by the grand jury of murdering his sister's infant child, to be hanged between six and twelve on August 28, 1913. In sentencing the prisoner the judge said he fully concurred in the verdict and, while the matter would be referred to the department of Justice, he could hold out no hope.

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, June 19.—The conviction against Charles H. Hyde, formerly of Truro, N. S., and ex-chamberlain of the city of New York, convicted of bribery by the supreme Court Jury, was over-rudden in the Appellate Division today. In the decision and order handed down this afternoon by Presiding Justice Ingraham, Hyde's conviction is declared to be due to an erroneous ruling of the trial court and District Attorney Whitman, was directed to have him discharged from custody and the indictment against him quashed. Hyde was out on bail.

(Canadian Press) VALLEJO, Cal., June 19.—Ten adults and one child met death in a collision on interurban trains on the San Francisco Napa and Callistoga Electric line near here to-day. The number injured will probably exceed 25. A mistaken order brought the cars together head on. The front cars of both trains were completely telescoped by the force of the collision. The victims were pinned down by the wreckage and the fire apparatus and house-moving outfit near by, were used to extricate them. The ten men who were all from nearby towns and the little girl were unidentified.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, June 18.—An interesting and valuable historical document was discovered recently, under unusual circumstances, and has been added to the Dominion Archives. It is a dispatch general order dated October 18, 1812, for arrangements for the funeral of General Brock, killed three days previously, at Queenston Heights. The document was found when the American Bank Note Company started erecting an addition to their factory on Wellington Street, Ottawa. A small stone building, dating back to the early days of Ottawa was being demolished. In the garret was found a number of boxes filled with papers. These proved to be official, many of them military orders. They were removed to the Archives and on preliminary inspection the order for Sir Isaac Brock's funeral was discovered.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 17.—The debate tomorrow in the House of Commons on the scandals connected with ministerial transactions in Marconi shares at the time the British Government was arranging wireless rates, seems likely to collapse.

The Government is not prepared to place any motion on the book in connection with the affair. Indications are that after introduction of the Opposition motion expressing regret at ministerial deals in Marconi shares and the lack of frankness of the cabinet toward the House, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lloyd George, and Attorney General Sir Rufus Isaacs will explain the matter perhaps acknowledging they committed an indiscretion. If this course is taken the House of Commons it is believed will accept the explanation.

(Canadian Press) CARDIFF, Wales, June 15.—The Terra Nova, Captain Scott's Antarctic ship, reached here today from Little New Zealand, coming by way of the Strait of Magellan. Thousands lined the docks and met the surviving members of the expedition.

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, June 18.—Matches in the hands of six and three-year-old Joseph and Lucian La Rue of St. Paul St., caused their death and the loss of their home by fire this afternoon. The charred remains of the children were found later in the building burned.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, June 15.—Dispatches from various points in southeastern Europe indicate widespread earthquake shocks. Sofia, Bucharest, Philopopolis and several towns in southern Hungary felt the effects but with no serious damage.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, June 18.—Edmund L. Newcombe, Deputy Minister of Justice, sailed for England to argue before the Privy Council an appeal of considerable importance. For some years there has been dispute whether the British Columbia government had control of the fisheries in the railway belt of British Columbia where such waters were below low water mark. The Supreme Court, on reference, decided that such power does not lie with the government of the province. From this judgment the McBride government appealed to the Privy Council.

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, June 15.—Col. Lord Brooks arrived this morning accompanied by staff officer Major Howard Wyse of the Household Cavalry on his way to Petawawa. Lord Brooks will take command of the cavalry brigade recruited from Central Eastern Ontario. This is the first step to interchange English and Canadian Officers, as arranged last year by the Minister of Militia with view to obtaining for the Canadian Corps the advantage of modern ideas in practical field training. Lord Brooks has been staff officer for Field Marshall Sir John French recently.

(Canadian Press) WINNIPEG, Man., June 15.—The result of over boosting the west was found in an action which three English plumbers threaten to take against the city of Prince Albert on account of alleged misrepresentation made by Walter E. Gunn, Secretary of the Prince Albert Board of Trade. They charge that Gunn, while in England, advertised for skilled workmen in all lines. They threw up their employment and came to Prince Albert on his recommendation. When they got there they could find no work either at their trade or in any other capacity and now they will sue for damages and for the money they have spent in travelling expenses, etc.
