Miss Alice Young of Boston, daughter of David Young, Commercial Cross arrived home on Saturday on a short vacation.

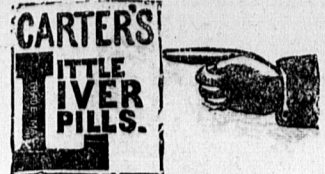

Cornell had on any glasses or not when he read the article entitled "The Bohemianism that Angers King Edward" it is very evident he did not use the precept "whatsoever things are lovely and of good report" when he attacked "The Guardian in his letter which appeared Sept. 12th.

Now that Rev. Mr. Crowell has made his charges it is "up to him" to prove them. Wherein "The Guardian sinned is not clear to my mind and it is safe to say that many others are in doubt. 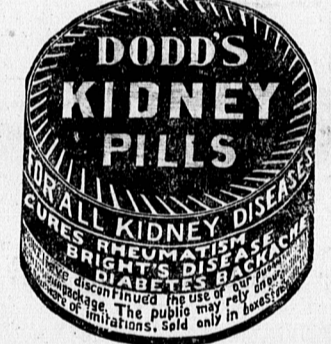
