DULL SESSION IN NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Stocks Drop Fractionally in Listless Market—Commodities Are Steady.

(By John L. Cooley Associated Press Financial Writer.)

NEW YORK, Aug. 15—Despite a long weekend, the stock market emerged today sleepy-eyed and fatigued, barely able to drag itself along in another dull and listless session.

Interest in acquiring stocks seemed to be negligible and the list as a whole dropped fractions to around a point. The so-called "wet" shares, as well as the gold issues, were more alert than the rest, closing steady. Bonds were irregular in a narrow and sluggish market and the dollar showed a firm tone in foreign exchange dealings. Most commodities were fairly steady.

Net Decline Transfers totalled only 1,222,280 shares. The Associated Press-stad and Statistics average for 90 selected stocks showed a net decline of one point.

The few stocks that did change hands today were largely among floor members of the exchange. By and large, the trading community, and the general public appeared content to remain on the sidelines, with one eye on the recovery drive of the administration, and the other on developments in the grain markets.

The fact that tomorrow the Chicago Board of Trade is scheduled to remove the "pegs" which have limited fluctuations in grains, doubtless accounted for much of the hesitation. All grains closed unchanged, but wheat lost 1 to 2 cents a bushel at Winnipeg. Cotton was fairly steady most of the day but closed 95 cents to \$1.15 a bale lower.

A general levelling off process apparently was indicated by reports from some of the basic trade centres. Steel production, as estimated by the magazine "Steel" remained unchanged, with new buy-outing retarded by uncertainties surrounding the industry's code and its possible effect on future costs. The Department of Commerce in its latest report for the week ended Aug. 5 found business activity showing a moderate recession, although this was attributed in part to seasonal influences.

In the share market some of the gold stocks were in moderate demand as a result of the Government's ruling that gold concentrates might be exported. This means that American companies heretofore limited to the domestic market with its fixed legal price of \$20.67 per ounce, can tap the world market at London where refined gold is quoted around \$30 an ounce.

Just what price the unrefined metal will bring, after allowing for all charges, has now been authoritatively estimated.

Stocks which lost fractionally to around a point or more included American Can, Santa Fe, Brooklyn Union Gas, J. I. Case, Lima Locomotive, Illinois Central, Great Northern Preferred, Du Pont, New York Central, Peoples Gas, United States Steel, and Westinghouse. Homestake Mining spurted 18 points and Allied Chemical gained 4.
