TWO CONDUCTORS BEATEN BY MOB

In The Big Montreal Street Railway Strike

One May Die, Both in Hospital—Manager Hanbury Arrested for Intimidation—Many Other Arrests.

CONDUCTOR MOBBED AND MAY DIE. MONTREAL, May 25.—(Special)—Very few street cars were running today. The condition of Conductor Latsburg, who was roughly handled by the mob of strikers and sympathizers on Sunday is serious and fears are expressed for his recovery.

BUSINESS MANAGER ARRESTED. J. Hanbury, business manager of the Street Railway, is under arrest on a charge of intimidation.

Thirteen arrests in all were made for offences in connection with the strike.

ANOTHER CONDUCTOR IN HOSPITAL.

Conductor Robinson, who was dragged from his car by the mob and beaten, is in the hospital with a broken arm and a crushed head.

THOUGHT TO HAVE BEEN DROWNED

Prince Edward Island Man Mysteriously Disappears

Herbert Sudsbury Supposed to Have Been Drowned on Moosehead Lake Tuesday Night in the Storm.

GREENVILLE JUNCTION, May 20.—Herbert Sudsbury, a native of Prince Edward Island, disappeared mysteriously from the steamer "Olivette" on a trip up the lake Tuesday night and it is supposed he slipped and fell or was blown overboard and was drowned. A high sea was running at that time, the wind blew terrific gusts and pitch darkness shut out every landmark. Sudsbury was a strong swimmer but no man could live in such a sea as raged at that time.

Sudsbury was acting as a temporary deck hand on the Olivette and was last seen alive by the captain, Stillman Sawyer, when he left in the pilot house near Hog Back Island, 15 miles from Greenville. Five miles farther up the lake near Moody Island the captain signalled for Sudsbury to come forward and when no response came to the second call he became alarmed and a fruitless search of the boat was made.

The steamer was toying a heavily loaded coal barge which made it impossible to turn back, had it seemed advisable. Search for the body has begun but its recovery is considered very doubtful owing to the vast territory in which it might be observed. Sudsbury has been employed at Kineo for a number of years past. He was unmarried and his only known relative is a sister, Mrs. Horace Wilson, who resided in Dover.

DOUBLE VICTORY WON BY ISLAND ATHLETES

At New Glasgow the Abegweits Defeat the Nova Scotian Team and on the C. A. A. Grounds the Victorias Win from Pictou—Exciting Games Eagerly Watched By Hundreds of Spectators.

The Victorias began their football career at the C. A. A. grounds yesterday afternoon under most favorable auspices, by defeating Pictou Football team four to nil. This result of their first contest was indeed a good omen and the superstitious of the blue and white will look forward to greater things in future. Although the match was the first for the Victoria Club, it was not by any means the first for the individual players; those who lined up yesterday "had all been there before" under different, and in some respects the same colors and were not new to the game. This fact however, does not in the least detract from the club's first football success.

The day was an ideal one for football. There was little wind, and the bright sun, although it sometimes rattled the backs playing against it, was kind to the three hundred enthusiasts who occupied the grand stand. The field was never in better condition, there were few steps and the work of the officials was satisfactory. The game itself was not a first rate exhibition. There was little open play, no excessively brilliant play, and only at times in the second half did the players seem to show great snap and life. Both teams showed lack of training and slow work was the result.

In the first half the Vics' heavy forward line overpowered their opponents at will but the failure of the quarters to get the ball back was a drawback. Pictou's full back made a number of costly mistakes and on three occasions by the superior work of the Victorias the visiting team was compelled to touch down for safety. A magnificent run by full back Poirier of the Vics was a feature of this half. He was brought down close to Pictou's line after a twenty yard dash around the end. The half ended nil-nil.

In the second half Poirier was brought up to half back and Drake was sent to full back. The change was a good one, for Poirier's running and tackling was an advantage. Three minutes before time Drake secured the ball close to Pictou line. He fell back for a drop and the ball passed between the posts. Score Vics 4, Pictou 0. Thus the game ended. (James Macmillan of the Abegweits was referee.)

The Abegweit Football team yesterday, true to the record of previous years and the long list of glorious victories achieved in the past, carried once more to victory the banner of their club amid the enthusiastic cheers of the three hundred admirers that accompanied them to New Glasgow and watched the battle in the Nova Scotian town.

Their opponents were among the most formidable that have ever met an Island team, among their players were several Dalhousie College's foremost men and our boys had the disadvantage of unknown ground and a tiresome sea trip, but they stood true to the confidence



placed in them and came out of the fray with a victory by a score 9 to 0. The main points of the game were the splendid forward work of the Abegweits and the judgment display by their halves during critical moments in the contest. The Abegweit forward line was a surprise even to those who have watched their training during the past month and it was only on rare occasions that the New Glasgow halves were able to break through their line. The stars of the New Glasgow team were Archibald and McDonald and their work was much admired. The New Glasgow forwards were heavier than the Charlottetown men but they did not possess the "snap" either in tackling or following that characterized the visitors. Excellent runs were made by all the halves, that of Gillis being especially noticeable.

The Abegweits won the toss. The New Glasgow forwards opened with a rush and for five minutes the result appeared ominous to the Island contingent. But before it was too late the Abegweits got down to work and in ten minutes before the close they had matters much their own way. A last effort was made the New Glasgows but they could not win. In the first half McEachern scored two tries for the Abegweits but they were not converted into goals, at half time the score was Abegweits 6, New Glasgow 0. In the second half the Abegweits scored one by Lightizer and the New Glasgow players were awarded two tries making the total.

The second try made by the New Glasgow half was disputed by the Abegweits but the referee had given his decision. It was claimed that the ball had been roused by Donahoe before the New Glasgow man touched it down.

Capt. Thomas Trainor of the Abegweits unfortunately dislocated his ankle at practice, and was not able to play. His place at the half was taken by Donahoe.

Nearly one hundred came from Pictou by the S. S. Lunenburg. They left on their return at 7 p. m.

MACEDONIAN REBELS SLAIN

Village Blown Up and Burned by Turks

Many Victims of the Fight—Tornado Wrecks Two Nebraska Towns With Considerable Loss of Life.

MACEDONIAN REBELS KILLED. VIENNA, May 25.—(Special)—One hundred and fifty Macedonian insurgents were killed at the village of Smerdesk.

The insurgents who had possession of quantities of dynamite sought refuge in the village and were attacked by Turkish troops. A VILLAGE DESTROYED. The fighting lasted thirty hours and ultimately all the houses were burned or blown up by the Turks.

A hundred and fifty bodies were found in the ruins. TOWN WRECKED BY A TORNADO. LINCOLN, Neb., May 25.—(Special)—A tornado struck the town of Pauline this morning killing six people. It is believed the entire town is wrecked.

PEOPLE KILLED IN NORMAN. The tornado also struck Norman, killing several people and many country houses were blown down.
