

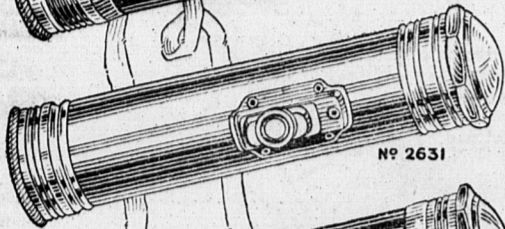

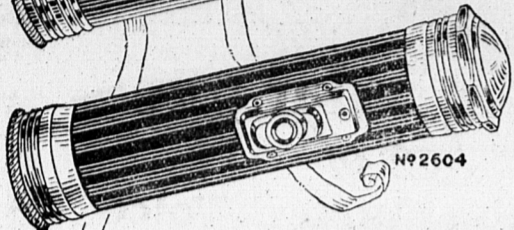

One of these had accompanied his request with an inquiry as to the right diet for an author, asking Mark Twain if it was true, as Professor Agassiz had said, that fish was good brain food. Mark Twain replied as follows:—The Mentor.

"Yes, Agassiz does recommend authors to eat fish, because the phosphorous in it makes brain. So far you are correct. But I cannot help you to a decision about the amount you need to eat—at least, not to a certainty. #### THE CROSS WORD PUZZLE GAME

#### ANSWERS TO THE PUZZLES

There are diagrams containing black and white squares. The white squares are to be filled with letters arranged in such a manner that they spell words answering the definitions given below each puzzle. Each word should start at the square in which the number appears and extend right or down to the first black square. Every square must be filled. Hence, if there are four spaces to be filled by a word meaning "aid" it is probable that the word is "help."

Go through the puzzle and write all the horizontal words you can, then try the vertical definitions. When all are correctly solved the words will cross each other and all spaces will be filled.

#### SCORING

The one who finishes first is credited with 300 points. The one who finishes second is credited with 280 points. The one who finishes third is credited with 260 points. The one who finishes fourth is credited with 240 points and so on, each finisher receiving 20 points less than the one who finished immediately before him.

#### DEDUCTIONS FOR ERRORS IN ANSWERS

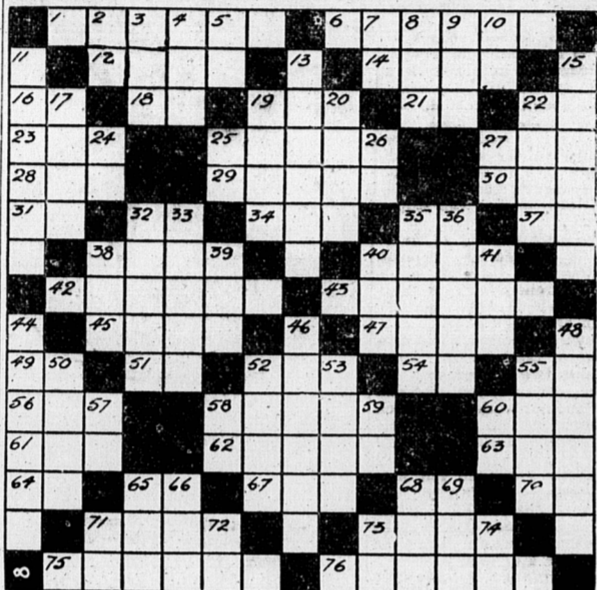
When all players are finished, the answer in succeeding issues is used to prove the accuracy of each solution. Three points are to be deducted for each error. Any words left unsolved count as errors.

#### THE WINNER

After the deductions for errors have been made from the total points secured for finishing quickly as described above under "Scoring," the winner is declared to be the one with the greatest number of points remaining to his credit.

#### THE LIMIT

It is well to set a time limit for the game, otherwise one player may hold it up indefinitely. All players who do not finish within the time limit are given 20 points less than the last one to finish.

### The Slender Line

The Newest Feature of Men's Styles in Coats and Suits

The tall man will be the forefront of fashion decrees this season. Slenderness is the appearance aimed at by designers of models for the well dressed man of 1924-25. According to Canadian designers this will be the distinctive style that will feature the coming season.

The "slender line" plain is to be followed in both overcoats and suits. The notches of lapels, buttons on coats and overcoats, pockets, belts and vest openings are all to be dropped somewhat to give the effect of slimmest to the male of the species. The "pinched" effects seem to be definitely passing from the correct style chart. Extreme ease and comfort are given expression in the long rolling fronts of suit coats; all appearance of stiffness gives way to the almost "lounging" expression of those lines that are to be featured.

#### Trousers Wider

There will be a distinct and noticeable largeness in trousers as compared with the tight-fitting trousers worn a season ago. Greater width at both the knees and cuffs of the trousers will be noticed. Some of the extreme models will show a conspicuous width at the cuffs that reaches well out to the end of the toe. The style forecast of the International Association of Designers given 1 1/2 knees and 1 1/2 bottoms, with and without cuffs. On the question of cuffs there is bound to be some difference of opinion. One designer stated recently to the Men's Wear Review that the better dressed men would have their trousers without cuffs. Another designer has stated that the cuffs was here to stay and that the great majority of models would continue to show the cuff. Generally speaking, the straight-line effect will be seen in trousers.

#### Belted Overcoats

For the season of 1923-24 there was a great deal of controversy with regard to the belted overcoat. Though many designers tried to get retailers to drop the three-piece belt altogether and cling to the belted back only, most of the garments supplied to the retail trade had the three-piece belts on them. Retailers argued that the three-piece belt gave them an extra selling point if necessary. The fall and winter season of 1924-25 will, according to designers, see a definite drifting away from the belts altogether.

#### SCARVES

One of the sad things about rough, soft wooden scarves is that they usually come away leaving one's coat lapels fantastically patterned with shreds of wool. Nevertheless their popularity persists, and there will be an up-let in their use until the spring sun forces them into oblivion. It is important that they should be brown. Brown, in all its varying shades and hues is to be popular for men this season, not only in scarves, but in suits, coats and shoes. It must always be remembered, of course, that the inevitable evening wear yields to no vagaries of fashion, but goes on unwaveringly, although styles may come and go. It is not suggested for a moment that brown shall be the color of the scarf one wears to keep the historic black overcoat from wrecking one's collar. This will be, as usual, white, and of some soft, ribbed silk or wool. The usual worked in black at the end of it. It is unnecessary to say that colors should be rigorously avoided for evening wear.

#### Interesting Varieties

For sport or day wear however, interesting varieties are offered to men in this year's styles. For sport wear, mufflers, sweaters and socks may match, if the pattern is not too distinctive. A shirt sweater of very fine, thin wool is a new thing for tennis. It fits rather closely, is long and settles closely about the neck. The usual monogram appears on the left breast in most models.

#### Chamois Gloves

Chamois gloves continue their already extended popularity. Bisquit brown is the prevailing color. The only noticeable change is the decline in popularity of the bright yellow chamois gloves of last year, which are now practically out of style.

The typical chamois glove of this year is finished like a gauntlet, without buttons or clasps at the wrist. It is made of stout skin very full at the end.

The day of the grey glove for general wear is over and kid gloves are never worn, except the white kid glove for evening wear, which is now worn only upon the most formal occasions.
