It will be the first time this has been done. This special census will include information showing trades of unemployed, sex and the industry in which they were last engaged. 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either side; although six Indian troopers were slain in one engagement in an orchard.

A report of a battle on Saturday gave the indication that the warfare is spreading from Peshawar and immediate vicinity. A party of Afridi's attacked Badama post, southeast of Parachinar in the northwestern frontier province. Parachinar is nearly 100 miles west of Peshawar. The assailants were beaten off by Kurram militia.

Meanwhile the tense feeling between Hindus and Moslems has caused troops to be rushed to the wide expanses of the Sind; a province of the Bombay presidency. In this region along the Indus river has occurred much fighting in the last two weeks. The trouble began in Sukkur, August 5th, 12 persons being killed and 150 injured, but that city was quiet today; since then there have been at least eight more deaths and 150 injured.

Now the trouble is centering in the districts remote from large cities. Troops will be posted in the villages of Pano, Akil, Sultanpur, Mirpur, Mathelo and other Talukas (revenue districts on the left bank of the Indus.

Official Statement

An official communique issued today appraised the Sind situation as follows:

"The disorders commenced in Sukkur but spread to Rohri and adjacent villages. The origin reportedly was in a dispute between members of a Svarajist procession (nationalist workers for independence) and a Moslem Tonga (cart) driver, exaggerated accounts of which give to alarmist rumors followed by serious clashes between the two communities.

"The casualties have been serious and the latest reports indicate that the situation is not yet under complete control."

Guns Boom at Peshawar

Peshawar, India, Aug. 13—The guns of Peshawar fort today boomed intermittently against the Afridi tribesmen attacking Peshawar while British and Indian cavalrymen skirmished with isolated parties in the belt of gardens immediately surrounding the city.

Fighting occurred at several scattered points; but there was no sign of a major engagement. Airplanes of the Royal air force, the scouts of the defending troops, reconnoitered throughout the day, watching for signs of a large concentration of Afridis.

Communications Cut

Lahore dispatches this morning reported that all communications except wireless between Peshawar and the rest of India has been cut. The government at Simla must now rely entirely on the Royal air force and the radio for information about the defence of the city against the Afridis.

Chief Of Police Returns Home

Chief Constable A. Birtwhistle, Mrs. Birtwhistle, and daughter, Rose have returned from Hamilton, Ontario, where Chief Birtwhistle was a delegate to the annual convention of the Chief Constables' Association of Canada.

Meetings were held in the Royal Connaught Hotel, during both morning and afternoon, at which were present over 250 delegates from all parts of Canada. This was the first time P. E. Island was represented; the Summerside Chief, John Kane, and the Charlottetown Chairman of the Police Committee, R. B. Holman, also being present.

Many items of importance were discussed and acted upon. Laws which had previously been recommended and in many cases put into effect, were discussed, while new amendments to the criminal code were suggested; chief among them changes in the vagrancy, and in the criminal act to provide for the fingerprinting of every man arrested.

The convention was addressed by many eminent men; one of the most important being Sir Henry Drayton, who spoke of Government Liquor Control in Ontario.

Chief Birtwhistle reports that the delegates and their wives were entertained royally.

One day all delegates and their wives were taken by special train to Niagara to see the variegated colour illumination of the falls at night and while there were guests of Howard Ferguson, Premier of Ontario, at a banquet in the Government building overlooking the falls. The next day another entertainment was furnished for them at the country home of Col. Eaton, which adjoins the Hamilton Windsor highway, and to which they were taken in motor buses. On Col. Eaton's spacious lawn, overlooking Lake Erie, they were given, a varied entertainment, which included, as a novelty, an exhibition of jumping by imported Irish horses. On the last day there was held in the Royal Connaught Hotel, a grand banquet, which was addressed by the Mayor of Hamilton, and other notables.

During the business routine, Chief Birtwhistle was appointed to the Executive Council as representative for P. E. Island and was nominated by Chief Kane of Summerside, as a member of a committee to interview the government at Ottawa on matters of importance.

In the election of officers for the ensuing year, James Smith, Walkerville, Ont., became president; A. S. Shute, Edmonton, Alta., Vice-President; and Chris H. Newton, Winnipeg, Man., was re-elected Secretary-Treasurer.

It was decided to hold the convention next year at Quebec City.

After the convention Mr. and Mrs. Birtwhistle and daughter Rose, spent two or three days touring southern Ontario and parts of Michigan, spending a pleasant time sight-seeing in Windsor, Kingsville, Leamington and Detroit, among other places.

Chief Birtwhistle reports a very successful and enjoyable convention, though the weather was nearly all the time uncomfortably hot. At that time Ontario had not had rain for a month and the temperature was seldom below 90 degrees.
