THERE was no movement in the Stanley yesterday. Cape Bear reported that the ice in which she was situated appeared very heavy.

RUSSEL R. McLEAN, Georgetown who has been waiting some days for the Stanley leaves today via the Capes for the Northwest.

ALEXANDER MARTIN, M. P. arrived from Ottawa last night having been called home by the death of his wife. He proceeds to Valleyfield this morning.

A LADY left a few weeks ago on a few weeks' visit to Toronto, sending her trunk via Georgetown. She has returned but the trunk is still at the winter port.

THE special was detained last night till 9.30 to cross the incoming western train at Royalty. The next crossing place west is at Hunter River the other sidings being blocked up.
