Canon Malone and Mrs. Malone. Dr. Holmes will speak at the public service in St. Paul's Church tonight in connection with the 33rd annual meeting of the Diocesan Church Society. The Rev. Dr. Judd of Toronto will take part in the service together with clergy of the Diocese. Dr. Judd is the guest of Rev. H. D. Raymond and Mrs. Raymond.

It is with the greatest regret we chronicle the death of Mrs. George Taylor who passed away suddenly at her home in Georgetown on Sunday morning, Feb. 21st. Though Mrs. Taylor had not been enjoying the best of health for several weeks, still no one had even a thought that the end was so near. The late Mrs. Taylor was a woman of fine character, and those words are not idly written, to know her was to admire her not alone for her intelligence and her happiness that she transferred to others. Always the bright optimistic viewpoint she cherished; gloom and moroseness found no haven in the mind of this fine young woman. Surely one stops to wonder why that in a time and age, such as this character capable of brightening and making more happy the lives of others should be called to rest. Her friends and her family numbered in thousands knows that today she dwells where surroundings are in accord with her nature. Mrs. Taylor has gone; but for many years her memory will be cherished. To the bereaved family and relatives we extend sympathy in this their hour of great sorrow. A meeting of the Directors of the King's County Exhibition Association was held in Town Hall, Georgetown, on Saturday, February 20, 1937, president Daniel A. Stewart, of Lower Montague presiding. The president in opening the meeting explained though this was not the annual meeting but the usual mid-winter meeting to discuss the business of the Association. The secretary then read a statement to the meeting of the most improvements to the exhibition property during the past year. The building of new hog pens, sheep hurdles, repairs to board fence on main street and erection of 34 chains of closely woven No. 9 wire surrounding the park at a cost of \$294.00 for fence and \$100 for hog pens, and other improvements and help at exhibition making a total expenditure of over \$700.00, which amount is paid leaving an unpaid note of \$150.00. The building of the fence was made possible by the kindness of the Town Council who donated labor to the amount of \$28.00 and to the citizens of Georgetown who generously gave to the amount of \$74.00. The directors present expressed themselves as being very pleased in having this new fence replacing the old unsightly board fence which had given service for over 46 years. A committee of five was appointed to wait on the Minister of Agriculture relative to the report that there would be a change in the county exhibition grants this year. The meeting was unanimous in the opinion that any change would not be in the interest of the many small exhibitors either at Souris or Georgetown fairs. But rather it would

place the money within the reach of the large exhibitor and therefore much of the educational value of the county fair would be lost.

BOY SCOUTS ASSOCIATION - A meeting of the Council of the Boy Scouts Association was held in the office of the Tourist Association yesterday afternoon, the President Mr. L. D. Murray in the chair. The Executive Secretary, Mr. Douglas Henderson reported on his visits to the various troops in the city. He made suggestions regarding further development of Scout work. Plans were submitted of a proposed shelter at Camp Roma, and the committee in charge were authorized to go ahead with the work when they deemed it desirable.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETS - The Charlottetown School Board in regular monthly session yesterday decided to purchase a supply of Dillelins from the Ontario Safety League to be posted in each of the City Schools in an endeavour to get the children to "Stop, Look and Listen" before crossing streets. The Board ordered 2,000 cards to be used in connection with Coronation Clean-up week in May. Prizes will probably be given in connection with the campaign for Civic beautification. A small number of library books were ordered for each City school. Dr. I. J. Yeo, chairman of the Board presided.

DEATH OF MRS. GEORGE DOUCETTE - Many friends will learn with regret of the passing of Mrs. George Doucette, whose death occurred at her home in Summerside on Sunday night. Mrs. Doucette was the wife of Mr. George Doucette of the staff of the Pioneer Publishing Co. She was 45 years of age and was the mother of 17 children, 13 of whom are living. UNSUCCESSFUL IN LOCATING CAR - Efforts to locate the automobile which broke through harbor ice near the Prince Street wharf Saturday with grappling irons and a sounding lead proved fruitless yesterday. The coach, owned by Mr. W. E. Phillips, sank after the operator and another occupant escaped from the vehicle as the ice gave way beneath it. The Rocky Point ferry, "Fairview" sailed around the vicinity where the car sank breaking up the ice after which a rowboat with a crew in charge of Walls McDonald began grappling operations. A temporary derrick has been erected on the ferry and when the car is located it will be hoisted on board the steamer and unloaded on the dock.
