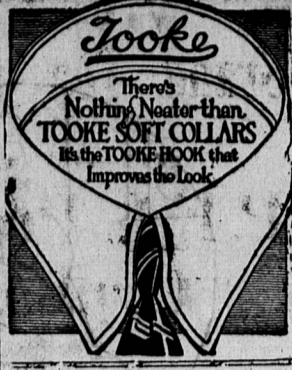

Miss Hughes on The Irish Question

Continued From Page One Irish Catholic gentleman of bold lineage and fine qualities but was representing the Dillon party.

There is but much vague knowledge in Canada about the Irish land question. Fifty per cent of the land holdings in Ireland today are "uneconomic"—under 15 acres of poor land on which a man cannot raise a family of four or five children. On the other hand as the Land Purchase Act is not compulsory many of the land owners, like our present Governor-General, each own 60,000 acres and more and will not sell one acre of it.

Lord French says there are 180,000 too many young men in Ireland today who should have emigrated. That has been the opinion of French and his predecessors.

In British official opinion it is a crime for the young Irishman to stay at home but the very thing which started me out in this case is the sight of those heart-weary old Irish mothers frequently without a child around them—all being overseas.

Do you realize that while the population of Ireland 70 years ago was almost nine millions it is now only four and a quarter millions? Not even Armenia shows such an appalling record. What would be the thought of the Canadian government if 70 years from now we only had four and a quarter millions?

The opinion is abroad in Canada that Ulster is all Protestant and all opposed to Irish self government. The facts are that Ulster population is 890,000 Protestant and 690,000 Catholic. The entire Province of Ulster lives in the Protestant faith but many of the Protestants are for the Irish cause, that there are now only two counties out of Ulster's nine which show a majority for the English Unionists against Irish self-rule. In 1918 there were four counties. The number is now reduced to two.

The cable despatches would lead one to believe that the Irish people have suddenly turned cut-throats and assassins. That impression is utterly false. There have been some murders in street riots and retaliation, but the moral restraint of the young manhood of Ireland, under intensive and deliberate provocation during the last two years has been admirable.

Sir Herbert Samuel, ex-cabinet minister, among many other high minded Englishmen, who have unreservedly condemned this occupation of Ireland by an English army said that if what is happening in Ireland had happened in Austria, England would have run with indignation at the Hapsburgs.

Canada, in her opinion, is a partner in an empire in which she alone gave the idea of co-partnership cannot afford to acquiesce in such coercion of any people in any part of the empire and so we Canadians have a moral right and a patriotic right as Canadians to support the claim of the Irish people to freely select their own government.

After dealing eloquently and lengthily with many phases of conditions in Ireland not only at the present time but centuries ago and claiming that Ireland was still suffering much from misrule the speaker said it was the intention to form a branch of the Irish Self Determination League here.

A convention of this organization is to be held in Toronto in September and a convention of the local body would be held either in Charlottetown or Summerside in August at which delegates would be selected to attend the larger convention.

2nd. There must be proper grading and classification in order that the article sold will correspond to the article advertised. 3rd. There must be educational work done in order that the fox ranchers will realize the necessity of production in quality as even more important than production in quantity.

4th. There must be co-operative buying in food stuffs as well as co-operative selling of fox pelts, thus ensuring not only cheaper but better fur goods.

5th. We must have one seller to many buyers rather than many sellers to few buyers, thus ensuring an enlarged market and a staple market.

Let us then co-operate in selling a trade marked fur of which we can be proud and with which the buyer and consumer will be pleased, and so sustain the reputation of the Prince Edward Island Silver Fox as the best in the world, and so compel those who are looking for a superior and exclusive fur to buy Prince Edward Island Silver Fox.

IN MEMORIAM

CAPTAIN ANGUS BROWN.

The news of the death of Wood Islands Wednesday of Captain Angus Brown will be learned with sincere sorrow. The deceased who was in his eighty-first year took to the sea early in life and for about twenty years sailed in vessels owned by Welsh & Owen. He was Commander of the "L. C. Owen" and the "William Owen" and other ships belonging to the firm. During a passage across the Atlantic he rescued the crew of a sinking ship and for this act of conspicuous bravery received a gold medal from the British Government.

After a long and notable career as master of sailing ships Captain Brown entered the service of the Federal Marine Department. He was for a time First Officer of the "Minto" and subsequently master of the "Stanley" holding the latter position for about five years. He later commanded the Earl Grey for about two years. That was his last ship. After leaving her he retired from the service and went to live on his farm in Wood Islands, about seven years ago.

Captain Brown has had a most enviable record as Master Mariner for he never lost a ship. He was not only a clever navigator but a man of high principles. He was of a sympathetic and kindly nature and a true friend. There are left to mourn one son William and one daughter Mrs. James M. MacMillan and a sister Mrs. C. McPherson all of Wood Islands.

Captain Brown was a splendid type of the master mariners whom his section of country has produced and his name will ever be closely identified with the history of our mercantile marine, and with the winter service between Prince Edward Island and the Mainland. In the latter service he gave splendid satisfaction, making regular trips under very trying conditions.

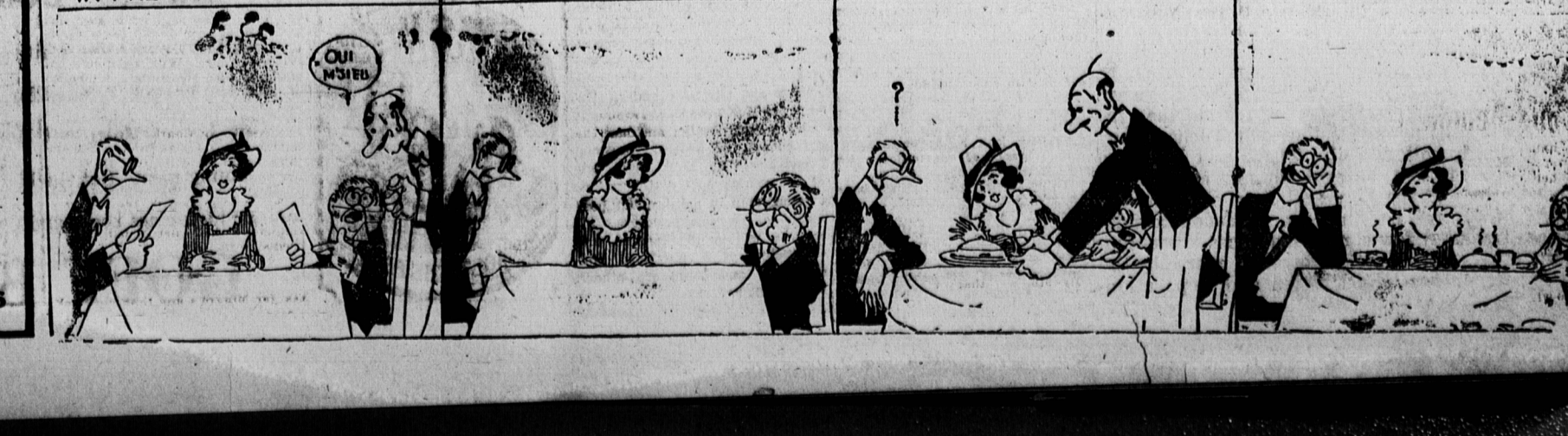
