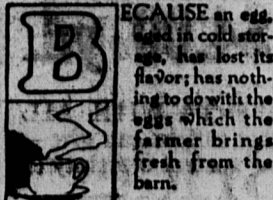

### PTE. NEAL McDONALD WOUNDED IN SPINE

Two More Veterans of the Great War Return Home.

Another Island veteran of the great war arrived in Charlottetown on Saturday night.—Private Neal McDonald, of Lewes, Lot 60. Privates McDonald left here with the 105th Battalion, and was transferred to the 48th Canadian Highlanders, and went with them to France. He participated in three notable battles, Vimy Ridge, Hill 70, and Paschaendelle Ridge. In the last-named engagement he was severely wounded, a bullet going through his spine. He was sent back to England, where he went the rounds of a number of hospitals, and was finally sent home to Canada, arriving in Halifax on a hospital ship a few days ago.

Another Islander, Lance Corporal Perry, of Summerside, also came over by the same ship. Pte. McDonald is a son of Mr. John McDonald, of Lewes, Lot 60. He has to report back to Halifax in two weeks' time.

### MODIFICATIONS IN FOOD REGULATIONS

Mr. C. H. B. Longworth, Chairman of Provincial Committee of Canada Food Board, who has been for some time negotiating with the Food Controller in reference to some modifications in regard to mid-day meal, received word that the following changes have been made:

Hotels—Eating Places—Boarding Houses

ORDER 46—Only part published. 1.—In this Order, (a) "Public Eating Place" shall include hotel, restaurant, cafeteria, club or club room, private family keeping boarders, boarding house, school, dining car, steamship or any place whatsoever where meals or refreshments are regularly served or sold to others than members of the family or household of the proprietor or caterer.

(b) "Poak" shall mean any part of the carcass whether fresh or cured in any form, save and except heads, tongues, feet, tenders, spare ribs, as cut by packers; sweetbreads, hearts, livers, kidneys, sausages, lard and products made therefrom.

(c) "Beef and Veal" shall mean any part of the carcass whether fresh or cured in any form save and except heads, tongues, tails, hearts, livers, heads, sweetbreads, suet, tallow, sausages and products made therefrom.

(d) "Meal" shall mean all the food a person consumes during any one of the periods for serving same as hereinafter limited.

(e) "Morning Meal" shall mean any meal served between the hours of 5.30 a.m. and 2.30 p.m.

"Mid-day Meal" shall mean any meal served between the hours of 11.30 a.m. and 2.30 p.m.

"Evening Meal" shall mean any meal served between the hours of 5.30 p.m. and 8.30 p.m.

### MEATS

1.—Beef and veal shall not be served except at the evening meal on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, provided however steaks made from chucks, briskets, plates, flanks and left-overs may be served at any mid-day meal.

2.—Pork shall not be served except at the morning meal on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday, and at the mid-day meal on Monday and Saturday.

### LICENSES

26.—On and after the first day of July, 1918, no person shall operate a Public Eating Place where meats or refreshments to the number of fifteen or more per day are served or sold to persons other than members of the family or household of the proprietor without first having obtained a license from the Canada Food Board.

32.—Every licensee shall display in his place of business the certificate of License, furnished by the Canada Food Board under this Order, in such manner as will bring same prominently to the attention of the public.

Mr. Henry W. Thomson, Chairman, states that these new regulations will be strictly enforced.

B. E. F. France May 13, 1918

Dear Miss Rex:—Just a few lines to let you know that I got your socks and was very glad indeed to get them. Thanks very much for them. It is certainly quite a treat to get things like that from dear old Canada, for they are so much better than the things we get over here.

Well Mary this is Sunday and we are out of the trenches on rest but we will soon be going in again. It will be a great thing when this war is over won't it. Then we can all get back home again. My home is in Monton, N. B. I would certainly like to be there today instead of this place and then I would be satisfied. This is my second time over in this country. I was wounded last year on May 4th and I was in Blighty most all winter. I came over here this time in March and I don't know how long I will have to stay here now. I only hope this war will be over before the winter sets in for it is awful over here in the winter. In summer it is not quite so bad. Well now, I will soon have to ring off as it will be time for Church parade. If you answer this letter I will be very likely able to write more next time. I will have to put my address in the letter some way for we are not supposed to put our address at the top or bottom of our letter. I am in the 26th Battalion Canadian D. Coy 15 platoon. Be sure if you write to put that on the letter and also my regimental number which is 709140. So now I guess that is about all for this time hoping to hear from you soon again. I shall close and go to church. Bye bye.

### NURSE PURPOSELY FORGOT A SPONGE

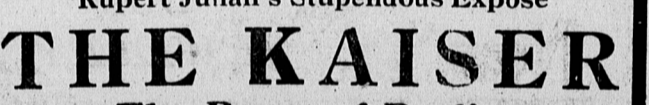
