OF ALL THE NATIONS ONLY THE BRITISH ARE SHIRKING

OTTAWA, August 4.—Sir George Foster, in one of his admirable patriotic speeches before the Governor-General, the Duchess of Connaught, and Princess Patricia, and a crowd of a thousand, declared that by reason of the war situation to-day, Canada is in a position of actual peril, and that this peril would increase a thousandfold if the Germans succeeded in reaching Calais.

He characterized as absurd the attitude of the men who are willing to fight the Hun only when he arrives in Canada. That, he said, would be to fight when the fight is lost.

"I want to make two points," he said, "one is to emphasize the extreme gravity of the situation, and the other is to urge the people of Canada to give proof of their appreciation of the liberties they now enjoy. Few people here will dispute the fact that the situation is extremely grave. We are fighting on three fronts. On the east on a line of 700 miles long; on the west on a line 400 miles in length, and near the old Dosphorus is being waged a contest which for heroism and grandeur has been surpassed nowhere in the present war.

"Let the Hun advance to the British channel," said Sir George, again, "and the peril to the Empire will advance a thousandfold."

"Every other country in the war," he said in his denunciation of the shirker, "owns every able-bodied man and its citizenry trained in the art of war. In Germany and Austria the shirker cannot hide behind his neighbor. In the British Empire the shirker is free; he can hang back while his loyal comrade goes to the front."

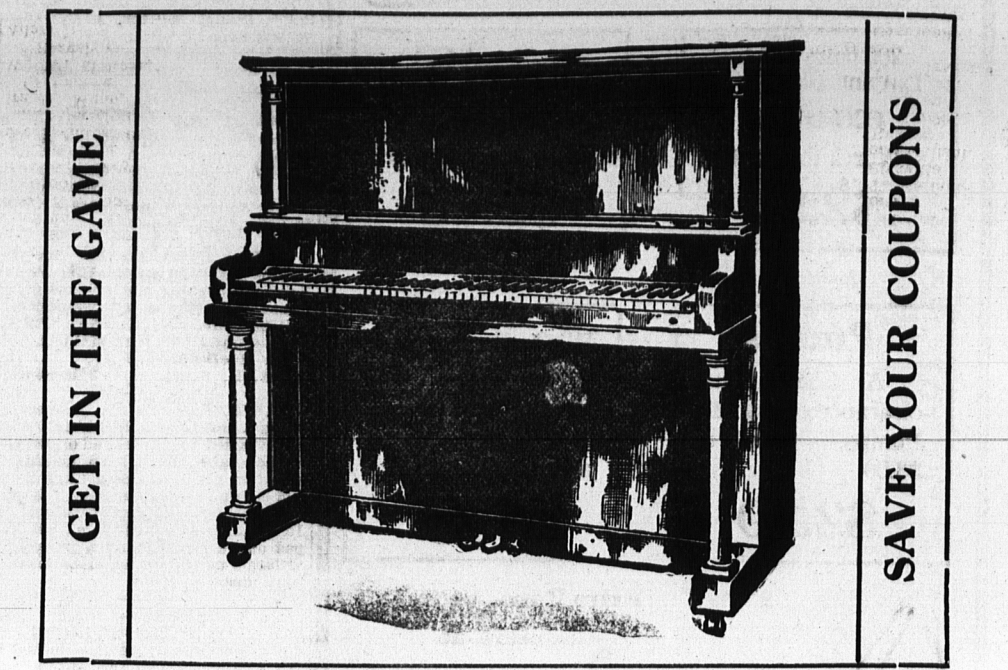

leading Germany logically to this step, and to cast the dye for the gigantic conflict in an attempt to impose domination on the world.

"Germany prepared for this war," says M. Hanotaux, "with a long hand as an enterprise of universal dominion. Once ready she chose her hour and dragged along her accomplice, Austria-Hungary, and her other accomplices, Turkey. Determined to stop at nothing, the day when it became necessary to sacrifice the world's peace and joy to her material prosperity and her pride, Germany willed war."

This is proved by historic documents, says Mr. Hanotaux, and he reviews the growth of the German "weltpolitik" idea, born at a meeting aboard the yacht Hohenrollern in 1897, recounted in Chancellor Von Buelow's book, and from which came the motto, "Our future is on the seas." Through fifteen years of military and naval preparations to 1912, when "the work of preparation was accomplished and Germany was ready to profit from the first favorable circumstances."

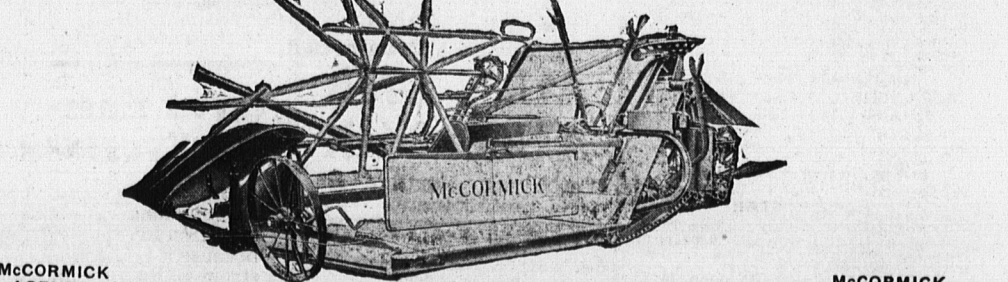
To these historic evidences of Germany's intentions, M. Hanotaux adds what he terms further material and moral proofs of Germany's "felt purpose."

Armed for a Struggle to the Death "From the material viewpoint," he says, "the far-sighted and formidable preparations of the twin empires, with a view to war, cannot be denied. With the most savage resolution, in absolute secrecy, with fists clinched, and lips closed, the two empires, armed to the teeth, constructed monstrous cannon, filled arsenals with arms and ammunition and conceived the prodigious mechanism for adapting the arts of peace to the art of war. The whole

country was regulated like a barracks. Every slightest resource was catalogued that nothing might be lost, and all with the purpose of offensive action. There were inventories in advance, the means of defense exploitable and the riches of the countries coveted. Universal espionage prepared the way for world conquest.

As moral proofs of Germany's purpose M. Hanotaux cites the growth of the conviction in Germany that a successful conquest is its own full justification, and that "the German people were the chosen people, the predestined people, in the religious, philosophic and scientific sense of the word; that everything in the world untouched by German influence must remain retrograde and inferior."
