A QUINCE deapatch of 23rd says:—The Quebec Harbor Commissioners held a very important meeting relative to the improvement of the St. Lawrence route yesterday afternoon. Some time ago the pilots recommended that the position of the Red Island lightship be changed, that it be removed some distance south until it would be in twenty fathoms of water. At a recent meeting of the commissioners which was attended by Sir Wilfred Laurier, this question came up, but Col. Gourdeau, the Deputy Minister of Marine and Fisheries, who was also present on that occasion, stated that the department had information which led them to oppose this and he would be pleased to meet the pilots a little later, when the details of the question could be thoroughly discussed. Yesterday was the day fixed and it was hoped that Sir Louis Davies would be present, he having arrived on Sunday from Europe on S. S. Tunisian. Sir Louis, however, was compelled to go on, owing to the illness of Lady Davies.

Yesterday evening THE GUARDIAN had a short conversation with Mr. F. T. Morrow, inspector of the cheese factories of the province. Mr. Morrow states that the drought has caused the quantity of milk to diminish, especially is it true of the patrons in the extreme eastern and western parts of the province. While new factories have been opened at Eldon, Tyne Valley, Hamilton and Reid's Corner neglect on part of producers is painfully apparent on all sides. Notwithstanding the discussion at the Dairyman's meeting patrons are still leaving their cans on the roadside and prefer to leave the cleansing of the cans until all the other work about the farm is performed. During the past few days the effect has been most disastrous as heat will tend to acidity. An improvement is noticeable in going about among the different factories in regard to the retaining of the old cheese makers. The difficulty to get milk in a proper condition still exists and as long as such is the case it will be impossible to make cheese with flavor. The time has already arrived when an instructor should go around among the patrons and instruct them in the care of their stables, talking with the people and endeavoring to remedy the difficulty of supplying tainted and inferior milk.
