Veal calves ranged from \$6.50 to \$9 with an odd top at \$9.25. Medium veals mostly \$7.50 to \$8. Drinkers were \$3.50 to \$6 and grassers \$3.00 to \$5.25 mostly \$5. Good ewes and wethers were \$10 buck lambs \$9 and culls \$8. Sheep were \$3.75 to \$5.50. Hogs were \$8.75 for baconers fed and watered and up to \$9 off trucks. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium with the regular cuts on off grades. Sows were \$4.50 to \$5.25. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$11.63 net weight.

Law Offices And National Registration

The Law Society of Prince Edward Island has been asked by the Federal Minister of National War Services as well as by the President of the Canadian Bar Association to render every assistance in its power in seeing that the registration in this Province for war service of all men and women of the age of 16 years and upwards is accomplished successfully. In response to this request, the members of the Council of the Law Society have unanimously offered to close their respective law offices on the dates for registration, namely, August 19, 20 and 21, so that they may devote their full time during those days to National Registration. The Council of the Law Society has also, by resolution, unanimously recommended that every lawyer in the Province give similar assistance during the days fixed for registration, and that every law student and experienced experimenter in such offices be set free to assist in such National Registration. As the questions to be answered in such Registration may need to be explained in order that they may be correctly answered and as this is work which the training and experience of members of the legal profession and of their students and clerks make them specially qualified to perform, the Council of the Law Society hopes that all lawyers and their students and clerks who can do so should give every assistance possible in such Registration. The service asked for is, of course, to be performed voluntarily and the Council asks the cooperation of the public in arranging any visits to any law offices they may be contemplating so as to leave the members of the legal profession and their staffs free to assist in such National Registration on Aug. 19, 20 and 31. Selling waves in the forenoon expanded volume substantially from recent creeping sessions and losses ranged from 1 to more than 5 points for pivotal industrial stocks. Canadian issues followed the general market trend downward. On the big board Distillers Seagram, Dome Mines, International Nickel and Walkers were 1-2 to a point off while Imperial Oil, Lake Shore and Shawinigan eased on the curb. Canadian Car gained 1-8. Canada 4s, among the bonds, were off 1-2. The Associated Press average of 60 issues dropped 1.3 points to 41.7, biggest decline for a single day since May 21. Transfers totalled 641,350. Prominent share sellers were U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, Douglas Aircraft, Western Union, United Aircraft, Westinghouse, Allied Chemical, Eastman Kodak, Du Pont, American Smelting, International Paper common and preferred, Loft, Great Northern, J. C. Penney and American Telephone.

AUSTRALIA MAKES HER OWN MUNITIONS

Sir Keith Murdoch, Director-General of Information, announced that the Munitions Department was planning the employment of 150,000 persons to produce raw materials and manufactures for the Commonwealth's contemplated munitions expenditure of \$290,000,000. Eight directors were to be appointed to deal with aircraft, ordnance, ammunition, explosives and fueling, machine tools, tools and gauges and material, labour and finance. Australia, said Sir Keith, could not expect munitions from Britain and must not only be self-sufficient but also assist the rest of the Empire. The Department could prevent skilled workers from emigrating or drifting into the luxury industries.

WHERE TO REGISTER Registration offices are being set up by electoral districts in the same manner as in the last Dominion election. Registrants are required to register in the regular polling subdivisions of their own constituencies. But should a registrant be in some other province or district out of the regular polling subdivision on Registration Days, he or she may register at any registration office convenient, upon satisfactory explanation to the local deputy registrar. Your Registration Certificate To every person answering the questionnaire fully and satisfactorily a certificate of registration will be issued by the local deputy registrar. This is a small card which must be carried on the person at all times.

Penalty for Non-Registration — Failure to register will make any male or female, married or single, over the age of 16 years, liable to a fine not exceeding Two hundred dollars, or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding Three months, or to both such fine and imprisonment, and moreover to a further penalty not exceeding Ten dollars for each day, after the day upon which he should have registered, during which he shall continue to be unregistered.
