RECORD MAKING EXTRAORDINARY.—According to the Patriot of yesterday three American youths have accomplished a new and astonishing feat in transcontinental travelling by Ford Car. Vitamines Must Be Taken Up By Expert Chemists
(Canadian Press)

TORONTO, August 15.—The time has come when vitamins, minute and mysterious adjuncts to the diet, which is otherwise complete as far as sugars, fats, protein materials and salts are concerned, must be taken up by the chemists, isolated and pure compounds, and identified. This was the attitude of world famous chemists and physiologists who discussed the state of knowledge on this new and important development in biological science at the British Association meeting. Among those who took part were Prof. A. C. Drummond, University College, London; Prof. H. C. Sherman, Columbia University; Prof. Walter H. Eddy, Columbia University; Prof. E. Melny, St. Thomas Hospital, London; Prof. W. Lash Miller, University of Toronto.

"We are beginning to recognize that vitamins are definite chemical substances which play their part in the growth of all forms of animal life, from the simplest to the highest," said Professor Drummond. He cited the case of a diatom, minute plant forms which would not grow properly in artificial sea water, but which flourished when the mysterious factor was put in by the addition of minute traces of natural sea water.

"We must distinguish between the accessory of the factors which are absolutely essential for growth, and those which aren't independent, but which stimulate it," he said. "The dependence upon minute traces of these factors becomes more marked as one ascends the scale of living things. The complex organisms suffer most when the accessories are removed."

In the class of the indispensable substances are the fat-soluble vitamin "A" found in butter and many vegetables, and in concentrated form in cod liver oil; water-soluble vitamin "B" occurs in yeast; a third class, known as the anti-scurvy vitamin, is found in lemons, in citrus fruits, and in many other fruits. It is absent from the diet among the "stimulating" accessories are the "bioses," which have been found potent at the University of Toronto and at Columbia University for promoting the growth of yeast to twenty times the extent to which it takes place when "bios" is not present, though only in minute traces.

Two More Vitamins.

"A year ago we recognized only these vitamins," said Professor Drummond. "We have now found that there are two others distinct from the first three. The anti-rickets vitamin controls by its presence or absence the disease rickets; it has recently been discovered that a fifth vitamin comes into play in the processes of reproduction."

"The old idea that vitamins are unstable, ill-defined compounds must go. We conclude from recent experiments that they are clear cut, definite chemical substances, which should be isolated and identified." The mysterious materials can be subjected to a great deal of abuse chemically, which indicates a simple and stable form, the scientist indicated. He showed how the three most important vitamins, fat soluble "A," water soluble "B," and the anti-scurvy, can be roughly handled with alkalis, alcohols and acids, and detailed the steps which chemists have taken in tracking down their compositions. "This is the pressing problem in vitamins research today," Professor Drummond concluded. "They must be identified as definite chemical substances; their functions in maintaining health, promoting growth, their part in reproduction, will then be understood, and the problems of their distribution and their regulation in the diet will be simplified," he indicated.

That the microscopic quantities suffice as far as the promotion of the growth of yeast is concerned, was brought out by Professor W. H. Eddy. A suggested chemical formula for the "bio" concerned was the surprise he had for the chemists. "This is only hypothetical," he admitted, in drawing a ring-like structure showing how he thinks carbon hydrogen nitrogen and oxygen are united to form the potent substance. Researches in other branches are confirming his suspicions, however, Dr. Eddy said.

A unique feature of his formula is that the "reacting weight," an index of the size of the molecule of the bios, is very low, which means it is a relatively simple substance, and hence not nearly as complicated as sugars or proteins, which have reacting weights running into the thousands, Eddy's bios measures 133.

Today we feel a legitimate pride in saying that the fifteen priests of St. Joseph's Parish, ministering at God's Holy Altar—one of whom has risen to the rank of Archbishop—together with the number of our young men now studying for the priesthood and the twenty-eight young ladies in the different Sisterhoods, are a gratifying proof that the tiny grain of religious vocations falls on receptive soil in St. Joseph's Parish.
