—MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—The Rev. J.A. D'Amours, whom Cardinal Beaudry named as the editor of his personal organ, L'Action Catholique, and who has been writing for a year and over in favor of Canada's participation in the present war as the best thing for the Dominion, and especially for French Canada, incurred the displeasure of Henri Bourassa.

The Quebec editor has just issued a reply to Mr. Bourassa. Abbe D'Amours accuses Bourassa of preaching the doctrine of independence to harm Great Britain, while she is at war, as the only solution for national wrongs. When Abbe D'Amours became a shareholder in Le Devoir, he says, he did not know what kind of man Bourassa was, and it was only when he began his editorial and patriotic movement in favor of the Germans and against the Allies that he saw the real object in view.

"Imagine, sir," adds the Abbe, "what would be the position of the poor French-Canadians today in the British Empire and the world at large had they followed your advice, and instead of marching with their compatriots, they had attacked underneath the past and present of England, and tried to belittle the effort of Great Britain to the advantage of Germany."

Proceeding, the Quebec priest tells of a reunion in Rome last December of distinguished men and of a prelate lately arrived from Belgium who declared that the German newspapers were scattering all over that country translations from Mr. Bourassa's articles, showing that the French-Canadians were separating themselves from Great Britain—and the Allied cause, consequently the wisest thing Belgium could do was to accept the inevitable. The Belgian prelate in question asked the Canadians present if the Mr. Bourassa, the author of the articles in question, utilized by the Huns, was the same man he had heard speaking at Lourdes, telling what Canada was doing for the Church and for France.

Abbe D'Amours said every Canadian present bowed his head in shame, although they had assured the Belgian that Bourassa's campaign was repudiated by the bishops and the Canadian people.

"Many leading theologians," Abbe D'Amours concludes, "in England, in France, and in Rome suffered the dishonor and contempt which fell upon the whole race as a consequence of Bourassa's articles," and he adds, "We will suffer a long time yet in order to expiate the venomous trades and your blind selfishness."

NOTHING INTRICATE IN GERMAN METHODS

ST. JOHN, Dec. 4.—That Canadian manufacturers believe that they are able, to duplicate every German article, worthy of being duplicated, right in this country in their own factories, is the statements made by Herbert Kiershaw, an official of the British board of trade who arrived in the city on Saturday.

Mr. Kiershaw came to St. John in charge of an exhibit of German made goods which will be shown in this city under the auspices of the board of trade next week. In speaking of German goods in general he said that the Germans had specialized on their markets and had made certain articles suited to each particular market, hence in a great measure their success.

"For instance, in the collection I have a razor which sells for two cents, and a dozen pairs of scissors which the Germans sold for sixty cents. Of course, you know they are, no good, but it demonstrates to what extremes the Germans will go in order to get hold of a market."

"I have found during my tour of Canada," he added, "that the manufacturers who come to the exhibit are deeply interested, that they learn new things and the general opinion is among them that they are able to produce those goods as well as the Germans."

"They notice the new shapes, new styles, new forms of workmanship, more perfectly suited to the work which the article is intended, and hence they get ideas which they did not possess before."

Mr. Kiershaw was one of the directing heads of the campaign started in the British Isles by the board of trade of a similar nature, and he said that there it was found that the British manufacturer benefited greatly by the exhibition, it being found that the German methods of creating articles at a low cost was so intricate and so profound as was at first supposed."

NEWFOUNDLAND HAS LOST FAMILY.

ST. JOHN'S Nfld., Dec. 4.—The extent to which the Newfoundland regiment suffered on the opening day of the British drive July last, became known today when figures of its losses were made public. In the fighting near Beaumont-Hamel, about one hundred members of the regiment were killed or died shortly afterwards from wounds, and the regiment lost 150 officers and men who were listed as missing and of whom no trace has since been found.

Of the five thousand men who went from this colony to join the British military and naval forces, about six hundred have been killed. The principal army losses occurred in last summer's drive and in the fighting in Gallipoli last winter. The men killed in naval service were scattered among many vessels, some of them losing their lives in actual sea fighting and others when their vessels were sunk by mines or submarines.

GERARD CARRIES NO PEACE PLAN.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—James W. Gerard, United States ambassador to Germany, returns to his post today bearing the views of President Wilson regarding submarine warfare and the deportation of Belgians for presentation to the imperial government. Before boarding his steamer, the Frederick VIII., Ambassador Gerard declared that he carried no peace plan back to Germany.

Mr. Gerard takes with him the equivalent of 100,000 marks which was raised through thanksgiving appeals issued by the American Red Cross committee for distribution through the embassy to needy widows, orphans and war sufferers in Belgium.

WESTERN PART OF TCHERNAVODA BRIDGE IS IN POSSESSION OF THE RUSSIANS

PETROGRAD, via London, Dec. 4.—The Russians have gained possession of the western part of Tchernavoda bridge, across the Danube, it was announced officially today.

South of Bucharest, the Teutonic forces have been driven back, the Russian statement says, and the villages of Tzomana and Gastinari have been recaptured.

The Tchernavoda bridge, the only one across the Danube for a distance of 600 miles from the Black Sea, was taken control of by Field Marshal von Mackensen after the defeat of the Russo-Rumanian army in Dobruja and the capture of Constanza and Chernavoda late in October. Over it passes the sole railway line directly connecting Bucharest with the Black Sea, and its capture by von Mackensen cut communications between Rumania and Russia by this land and water route. The main span of the bridge itself is only about half a mile long, but the approaches to the west stretch for several miles over the marsh lands bordering the Danube. At last reports the Rumanians fighting their way back southward in Dobruja were some fifteen miles north of the bridge on the Dobruja side. Their present seizure of the western end of it may only be intended to prevent its use by von Mackensen in throwing troops across in the rear of the Rumanian forces around Bucharest.

Tzomana, reported captured from the Teutonic invaders, is about 16 miles south of Bucharest, on the railway line from Giurgiu and Conteniari lies about five miles east of Tzomana.

Main Body of Enemy Driven Back.

Bucharest, Dec. 4.—(via London.)—The main body of German and Bulgarian forces southwest of Bucharest has been defeated and driven back toward the south, the war office announces. The Rumanians also were victorious in a battle with the Turks. On the right wing of their western front the Rumanians were compelled to retire. The announcement follows:

"On the western front in Moldavia and Wallachia there were lively artillery and infantry actions. We attacked the enemy at various points, taking 180 prisoners.

"In the valley of Damovitia, north west of Bucharest, the situation is unchanged.

"On the right wing of our western front the enemy attacking stubbornly has compelled our troops to retire towards Titu. On the Glavatzitza and Niaslov our troops defeated a Turkish division in the region of Draganechti (34 miles southwest of Bucharest) and the main body of Germano-Bulgarian forces in the region of Ghimpati and Mihalochti (41 miles southwest of Bucharest) driving them back towards the south. We have taken prisoners and war material, not yet enumerated.

"In Dobruja artillery fighting occurred."

DOCTORS FIND GERM OF INFANTILE PARALYSIS.


ST. PAUL, Dec. 4.—A germ believed to be the causative agent of infantile paralysis has been isolated at the Mayo clinic in Rochester (Minn.) by Dr. E. C. Rosenow and his associates, Dr. E. B. Towne, of Boston, and Dr. G. W. Wheeler, of New York, according to an announcement made in the St. Paul Dispatch. The scientists are experimenting on a vaccine or serum to combat the disease.

The physicians would not state positively that the micro-organism discovered was that of infantile paralysis, but said that the experiments were based on the study Dr. Rosenow made of more than fifty acute cases of the disease in New York and in Rochester.

What is described as a peculiar "polymorphous streptococcus" has been isolated often in large numbers from the throats and tonsils of acute cases of infantile paralysis.

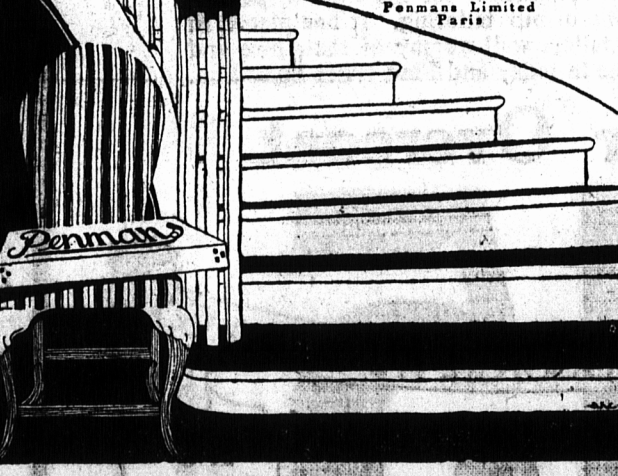




