

Beavers In 5-3 Victory Over Moncton Hawks

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Feb. 6 — (CP) — Two goals a minute and 47 seconds apart late in the second period gave Saint John Beavers a 5-3 victory over Moncton Hawks here tonight and kept Beavers within striking distance of first place in the Maritime Senior Hockey League.

Halifax St. Mary's nipped last-place Amherst Ramblers 4-2 at Halifax to maintain their one-point lead over Beavers established Saturday night. Beavers with 91 points are 11 in front of Hawks and 80 ahead of Ramblers. They could regain the top spot by whipping Ramblers at Amherst in the only league game tomorrow night.

Maurice (Mouse) Dowling sniped a pair of goals to lead Beavers to their first win in three games. Dick Wray, Lorne Smith and Roy (Buck) Whitlock picked up the others. Wray had two assists and linemate Vic Jackson helped on three tallies.

Lou (the Magnificent) Milani widened his margin in the scoring race over Whitlock to four points by assisting on Moncton's first counter and banging in the second. He now has 63 goals and 42 assists for 105 points while Whitlock has 55 and 43 for 98. Les Colvin in the Moncton cage handled 32 shots to Floyd Perras' 22. He was a busy man in the second period when Beavers outshot Hawks 20-10.

Only five penalties, four to Moncton, were called as the referees appeared lenient. Highstick and boarding offences ran loose in the rough, heavy-checking game.

U. N. B. In 7-0 Victory Over St. Dunstan's In Intercollegiate Hockey

Pete Kelly's University of New Brunswick pucksters proved too fast and rugged for the McAdam-coached Saint Dunstan's University aggregation here at the Forum last night when they dumped them for a 7-0 shutout in N.B.-P.E.I. Intercollegiate Hockey championship competition for an undisputed victory.

The win sent the U.N.B. squad into sole possession of the series leadership, two points up on second place Mount Allison University, and left Saint Dunstan's stranded in the cellar with two losses in as many starts.

Playing fast, aggressive hockey that came up with smart passing attacks, the victors were never in serious trouble, and outshot the Saints 4-0 in the first, picked up between the pipes during pressing U.N.B. attacks. He never stood a chance on the seven that got past him during the game. The U.N.B. boys showed plenty of polish on their plays in around the net and in almost every instance caught Saint out of position and down on the ice when the pick hit the mesh.

The local boys made some smart breaking attacks at times, but their opponents were too fast on the back-checking to let them get away unhampered and on almost all occasions skated off the attacking Saints forwards and very rarely gave them a clear shot on goal. The U.N.B. boys kept the Saints under pressure throughout most of the game with smooth-working power attacks that kept the Saints pinned up behind their own blue line.

Tom Bliss was the top man on the scoring for U.N.B. with a brace of goals while Kennedy, Gaudet, Thompson, Malone and Gaudet notched up one each for the remaining tallies.

Although both teams came up with some good body checking at times, with Mike Hennessey and George MacRae turning in smart performances back on the Saints' defence, the game was cleanly played with eight penalties handed out by referees Lawlor and Jay for minor infractions, all coming in the second and third periods after a no-penalty first frame.

HALIFAX, Feb. 6 — (CP) — Barbara Ann Scott and another ice show are interfering with the Maritime Senior Hockey League playoffs, scheduled to start Feb. 20.

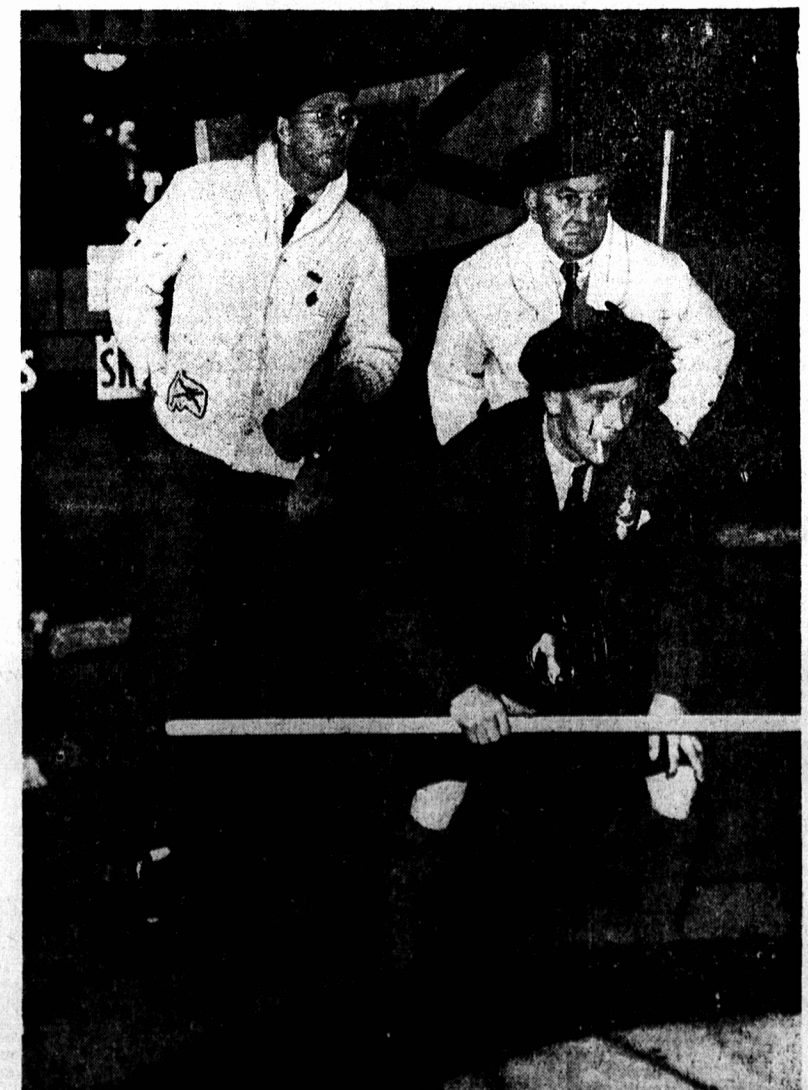
