The funeral will be held on Friday at 2 P.M. from the home of his son, Walter. Interment will be in Wilmet cemetery.

Says McNaught Leads in Prince By 80 Votes

The returning officer for Prince, Mr. W. L. Delaney of Kensington, announced last night that Mr. J. Watson McNaught, Liberal party candidate had been elected by 80 of a majority on the basis of a majority in Monday's federal election. He said he had just received the official returns from the last of his deputy returning officers.

Mr. Delaney gave these totals: McNaught, 6,941; Lt. Col. E. H. Strong, Progressive Conservative, 6,861; Cyrus F. Gallant, C.C.F., 718.

Totals for the constituency had been in doubt since election night when the returning officers telephoned their poll results to party headquarters at Summerside and neglected to call the returning officer here.

and Brig. William N. Bostock, Ottawa and Vancouver, assistant deputy adjutant general, were given the C.B.E.

Air Force Awards

The Air Force awards followed the same pattern. The C.B. went to Air Vice-Marshal Frank S. McGill, Montreal, a nonpermanent force man who is in charge of Supply and Organization, with an important hand in the early formation of the Commonwealth Training Plan; Air Vice-Marshal George B. Rowland, Ottawa and Port Perry, Ont. in charge of scaling down establishment to meet needs of the second phase of the war; and Air Vice-Marshal Thomas A. Lawrence, Edmonton, commander of the Royal Canadian Air Force, which is growing in importance as the Dominion's war effort switches to the Pacific.

One of the highlights of the awards was a bar to the George Medal to Lieut. George H. O. Rundle, who served in the Royal Canadian Air Force, and who was killed in action in Halifax at the risk of his life and made the port safe for shipping.

The importance of "entertaining the troops" was recognized in at least two awards. The O.B.E. to Capt. Joseph Connolly of Ottawa and Halifax, who had much to do with the air force's contribution to the war, and the M.B.E. to Lt. Wishart N.M. Campbell of Barrie, Ont., who gave the junior service shows like "Blackouts."

Highest Woman's Award

Highest award to a member of the women's service was the O.B.E. to Col. Margaret C. Eaton of Toronto, Director-General of the C.W.A.C.

The sons and daughters of at least two Canadian and Canadian Army men were included in the list.

Set. Evelyn B. Constantine, C.W.A.C., daughter of the late Maj. Gen. C.F. Constantine, formerly commanding officer of No. 2, Toronto, and a British Empire Medal (B.E.M.) while Sqdn. Ldr. Andrew (Andy) R.L. McNaughton, son of Gen. McNaughton who is an Air Force Cross. No citations were given but it is known that Sqdn. Ldr. McNaughton was contributor much in the way of science to the R.C.A.F.'s test and development unit at nearby Rockcliffe Air Station.

The list also included one newspaperman—Wing Cmdr. Rod MacInnis of Ottawa, Ont., who recently retired after serving as Chief Public Relations Officer of the R.C.A.F. at home and previously overseas. He received the M.B.E.

The civilian list included nine members of the merchant navy who fought U-boats and enemy aircraft in the Atlantic and the Pacific and 10 Nova Scotia fishermen who brought their little vessels close to a shipwreck and saved the lives of a crew.

AUSSIES TAKE ANOTHER JAP FIELD ON BORNEO

(By The Canadian Press) Australian invaders of Borneo captured another airfield yesterday while Americans on Okinawa Island shattered organized Japanese resistance in the Oroku peninsula pocket and took a firmer hold atop the bloody southern escarpment where the fanatical Japanese are making a death stand.

A Guam commando reported the Japanese continued to fight furiously along the southern Okinawa line but that Americans moved forward in all sectors.

On the Borneo front veteran Australian troops captured an airfield as they drove southward for Brunei town, capital of the British Brunei protectorate. It appeared the Japanese would give up Brunei without a fight.

The Aussies put a miners on Brunei town. One column captured the airstrip and then drove southward to within two miles east of the capital and reached high ground overlooking Brunei's waterfront.

The Aussies on Labuan Island, in Brunei Bay, drove northward to within two miles of the rimah airfield. Other units battled the Japanese west of the Australian-held Labuan airstrip.

Japs Fire Oil Tank

The Japanese, obviously fearing a surprise move, set fire to the great oil tank storage areas in the Seria and Miri fields far south of the main invasion beach.

In the northeast Philippines Americans beat down determined Japanese resistance and were within five road miles of the Cagayan valley.

Chinese Score Gains

In the strategic coastal area of East China, Chinese pushed their way northward on the heels of the retreating Japanese, recaptured Julian and drove on toward the port of Wenchow, 14 miles to the north.

Big 5 Win Approval Of Veto Voting Formula

SAN FRANCISCO, June 13 (AP) - The Big Five were reported today to have won approval of a United Nations conference committee for the veto voting formula which some small powers fought to the end. On the final ballot, delegates leaving the closed committee room said Cuba and Colombia cast the lone opposing votes, but 15 countries did not vote.

This decision hurled the last major obstacle to early completion of the permanent peace charter on which the United Nations security conference has labored for seven weeks.

Canada was one of the countries originally supporting the Australian amendment, suspending operation of the veto power over proposals to end a dispute by peaceful methods.

However, the Canadian delegation in the face of obvious certainty that the Big Five would demand full exercise of the Yalta formula, abandoned the fight last week and urged others to do likewise in the interests of harmony.

The Canadian attitude was that, unpalatable though the formula might be, it was better to swallow it than to prejudice the success of the conference by alienating any one of the Big Five—particularly Britain, Russia and the United States.

In the voting today Canada voted for the formula but Australia and New Zealand were among the 15 countries abstaining.

15,000 Southampton Dock Workers Strike

SOUTHAMPTON, England, June 13 (Reuters) - Military personnel took over loading of ships here today as 15,000 dock workers went on strike; union officials and port employees said in a joint statement the dispute arose over whether additional men should be engaged in loading certain types of cargo.
