Scout News and Notices

JUNE 1, 1939 - NO. 184

Wolf Cubs of the North Quadra Pack, of Victoria, B.C., have for some time been collecting old linen and cotton sheets and pillow cases to be sent to Boy Scout first aid workers in China, for the making of bandages.

At least 1,000 representative Scouts from all parts of the British Isles gathered at St. George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, on St. George's Day, for the annual ceremony of reaffirming their Scout Promise. Included were a number of handicapped Scouts of the Heatherwood Hospital Scout Troop and a number of deaf and dumb Scouts. They were reviewed by the King and Queen in the castle quadrangle.

Scouting decorations held by the late Percy Everett, of the International Bureau of the Boy Scouts Association, included the Silver Wolf awards of Great Britain, Latvia, Lithuania, Norway and Sweden; the Silver Buffalo of the Boy Scouts of America, the Silver Bear of Old Russia, the Gold Medal of Merit of Roumania and Spain, the Cross of Merit of Austria, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, France, Greece, Hungary, Italy, Poland, Portugal and Roumania, and the Order of the Sacred Treasure of Japan.

Scouting is by no means the only public service interest of Sir Percy Everett, Kt., M.A., F.S.S., Deputy Commissioner of Imperial Headquarters of the Boy Scouts Association, who is to visit Canada in August. For many years he has been chairman of the Royal Free Hospital, London, said to be the finest institution of the kind in England; also chairman of the governing committee of the Flatlow Maternity Hospital. It is claimed for the latter institution that it has brought 5,000 babies into the world in a single year with the lowest maternal mortality on record. In his home community of Ebbw Vale, Britain's "Hollywood," he is a member of the Paris Council, and Chairman of the Bushey Hospital. Boy Scout circles are waiting to learn whether General Franco will disband the Boy Scouts of Spain, as has been done in other dictator countries.

"We could not feel that this great exhibition of international character as it is, and representing all the social and economic needs of our country - would be complete if we did not have this Scout camp," - President, Grove Whalen of the New York World's Fair, at the opening of the fair's Boy Scout camp.

A telegram from the Deputy Chief Scout, Lord Somers, expressing the Scouts of Iraq the sympathy of the Boy Scout of the British Empire to the tragic death of His Late Majesty King Ghazi I, brought the following reply from the Executive Scout Secretary at the Directorate General of Education, Baghdad: "We are deeply touched by your message of condolence. Appreciate with thanks your note of sentiment."

The following story of a happening in India was related by Mrs. W. C. Nichol, a Girl Guide leader of Victoria, B.C. - "I was sitting in a bus en route fromagra to see the tomb of Akbar when in front of me appeared a squad of familiarly garbed young men. As we drew near I found they were Scouts, going to or from camp. As I passed, I caught the eye of one of them, and gave the Guide (and Scout) salute. Immediately my tongue was surrounded by about 30 huge Brahmin boys, all jabbering at once. The Scout in charge spoke a little English, so he acted as interpreter, and the boys and I entered into an animated conversation. They were most interested to hear that I came from far off Canada, and particularly wanted to know all about camping in our country. I had a cine-kodak so they arranged themselves in a half circle, with the Union Jack too, while I photographed them. They accompanied me all the way to the magnificent tomb, and three of them escorted me through it. The happening was just another instance of what potent thing is the Girl Guide and Boy Scout salute.
