That no warship that is unlawful and infamous act will be committed can possibly be accepted as an excuse or palliation for that act, or as an abatement of the responsibility for its commission.

EXPECTS ACTS DISAVOWED.

Long acquainted as this Government has been with the character of the Imperial Government, and with the high principles of equity by which they have in the past been actuated and guided, the Government of the United States cannot believe that the commanders of the vessels which committed these acts of lawlessness did so except under a misapprehension of the orders issued by the Imperial German naval authorities.

pected to do nothing that would involve the lives of non-combatants or the safety of neutral ships, even at the cost of failing of their subject of capture or destruction. "It confidently expects, therefore, that the Imperial German Government will disavow the acts of which the Government of the United States complains, that they will make reparation so far as reparation is possible for injuries which are without measure, and that they will take immediate steps to prevent the recurrence of anything so obviously subversive of the principles of warfare for which the Imperial Government have in the past so wisely and so frankly contended.

REGRETS NO JUSTIFICATION.

"The Government and people of the United States look to the Imperial German Government for just, prompt and enlightened action in this vital matter with the greater confidence because the United States and Germany are bound together not only by special ties of friendship, but also by the explicit stipulations of the treaty of 1825 between the United States and the Kingdom of Prussia. "Expressions of regret and offers of reparation in case of the destruction of neutral ships sunk by mistake while they may satisfy international obligations, if no loss of life results, cannot justify or excuse a practice the natural and necessary effects of which is to subject neutral nations and neutral persons to new and immeasurable risks.

"The Imperial German Government will not expect the Government of the United States to omit any word or any act necessary to the performance of its sacred duty of maintaining the rights of the United States and its citizens, and of safeguarding their free exercise and enjoyment.

WINSLOE—Mr. L. H. Hewson of the Live Stock Branch, Ottawa, and Prof. Theodore Ross, attended an Agricultural meeting at Winsloe on Saturday for the purpose of explaining to the wool growers the experiment which is to be made this year in the marketing of wool on a quality basis. As wool is at present marketed in fleeces of the long woolled sheep and of the short woolled sheep all go together, and as the manufacturers use these for different purposes, there is a great difficulty in sorting out the wool. The washing of the wool adds more difficulty by further mixing the fleeces. These present a special opportunity for the improvement of the wool, and it is planned to assist with the experiment which is to be made this year in Summerside. Tonight Mr. Hewson speaks at Murray River.

RAILWAY MEN VISITS CAR FERRY WORKS

(Continued from page one)

that the whole stretch of sea intervening is being filled with a solid wall of stone, some idea may be gleaned of the extent of the work. Beginning from the shore, there will be, when everything is completed, a solid stone structure of fifteen hundred feet out to the "crib" referred to, and then projecting from the "crib" the pier of 700 feet will be built—or twenty-two hundred feet of stone work from the tower on Carleton Point to the end of the pier. But that represents only half of the project. From the shore also, running approximately in a direction East to West, and at about right angles to the pier, will be a massive breakwater, 2,200 feet in length to form, with the other construction, an enclosure or a kind of harbor, which will be dredged. Yesterday, a huge scow was taking stone to the breakwater, which is in question can take as much as thirty I. C. R. car loads of stone, and it will therefore be seen what a prodigious amount of material is being used. This stone comes from Shediac, and is all huge and massive, some slabs being twenty or more feet in length. The stone-carrier between the towers are operated from the crib engine which is installed a powerful engine. There is telephone communication between the two towers. A great deal of what has been done so far has been foundational, but the work is going ahead wonderfully, and the result of each day's labor from now on will be perceptible. Although the water is not yet visible in the distance, its direction is quite marked by an instinctive ripple from the shore outward. When the Car Ferry is completed it will represent the consummation of a colossal undertaking for the Province of Prince Edward Island, and will stand an impressive monument for all time to come, to one of the largest and most beneficial things ever done in its behalf. Carleton Point already is assuming a more vigorous appearance and evidence of this is seen in the new houses that are being put up. This is one of the most delightful spots on the Island in the summer, and with the car ferry in operation, there is no doubt as to what the future will be.

OVER \$100,000,000 IN WAR ORDERS

NEW YORK, May 16.—It is now conservatively estimated that Bethlehem Steel has booked at least \$100,000,000 of business in war contracts. The total taking into consideration the work that has been sublet is greatly in excess of that figure. Bethlehem Steel Works, due to inadequate capacity to meet the extraordinary demand for shrapnel, has farmed out work valued at millions of dollars to companies with facilities for machining shells or making shell parts. Bethlehem has closed a contract with one company which calls for machining of 10,000 shells daily or 3,000,000 a year. The steel shells are forged by the Bethlehem Company and finished by the machine company.
