ONTARIO SWEEP BY SNOWSTORMS

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS.

The market Tuesday was fairly well supplied.

Dressed Hogs at 5 1/2 cts was the regular price offered for medium weights, but 6 cts has been paid for choice well fed and cleanly dressed pork.

The Dominion Packing Company is now paying 5 cts per lb. for good live hogs, over 170 lbs. and lower figures for inferior grades.

Beef by the quarter or carcass (dressed) is quoted at 4 1/2 to 6 1/2 according to weight and quality.

Oats are quiet, black is bought at 30 cts per bushel, white at 29 cts per bushel.

Chickens and fowl are selling at 7 to 8 cts per lb. Turkeys 12 to 13 cts per lb. Geese 8 cts per lb.

Hay baled (good timothy) is quoted at \$12.00 to \$12.50 per ton. Hay loose at 60 to 65 cts per 100 lbs.

Butter from market baskets is plentiful 24-25 cts per lb. and by the tub at 18 to 20 cts per lb. Creamery prints 23 to 24 cts per lb. and eggs at 22 cts per doz.

SOUTH OXFORD BYE-ELECTION

For Ontario Legislature Took Place Yesterday

Partial Returns Show Munroe, Liberal, Leading by 300 - Snowstorm and Cold - All Roads Blocked.

ELECTION UNDER DIFFICULTIES.

WOODSTOCK, Ont., January 26. (Special). - The bye-election for the Ontario Legislature in North Oxford today took place under great difficulties owing to the continued snowstorms and intense cold of successive days.

ROADS BLOCKED WITH SNOW. All the roads are blocked and trains are greatly delayed, rendering it extremely difficult to get returns.

ONLY PARTIAL RETURNS.

With about half the polls to hear from Col. Munroe, Liberal is leading about 300 over Baker, Conservative, and is in all probability elected.

RECORD OF THE RIDING.

North Oxford was the late Sir Oliver Mowat's constituency and has a very strong Liberal record, often carried by acclamation or upwards of 1,000 majority.

IN A MAGNIFICENT GAME THE ABEGWEITS ARE VICTORIOUS

Defeating Crystal-Pioneers in a Hard Fought Contest in Summerside Last Night - Intermediate Abegweits Also Win.

SUMMERSIDE, Jan. 26. (Special). - Summerside saw its defeat in the Senior Game of Hockey in Crystal Rink tonight in one of the hardest, keenest, cleanest and best contests witnessed here for a long time.

The rink was crowded and the spectators, pleased with the progress of the sport kept the building full of noise. The whistle of the Referee W. Walsh sounded at eight sharp and at 8:35 the game began. The first goal was scored by the Crystals after ten minutes play, and it took out two minutes for the Abegweits to even things and another two minutes to go one better. At 8:25 the Crystals again shot effectively and the struggle was once more in the balance.

another goal to their score, and in a few minutes later made the count 9-6. After several minutes more struggle Charlottetown was in the lead and raised the score 8-6. It was up to the Crystals to fight hard. They scored and the count stood 8-7.

The game in the second half saw the puck moving alternately from one end of the rink to the other with many lifts from point and cover point. Amid tremendous cheers the Crystals again evened the score, and now the game grew still hotter.

With only four minutes still to play and the score equal excitement grew intense. It was now a test of endurance. Which side would win was the difficult question which the onlookers dared not solve. The suspense was broken one half minute before the bell rang when the Abegweits got the deciding goal leaving the ice victorious with the score 9 to 8 in their favor.

Captain and Mate Meet Death in Icy Waters

No Hope for One Hundred and Eighty Entombed Miners - Fifteen Killed by Fall of a Cage.

SCHOONER SUNK IN COLLISION.

BOSTON, Jan. 26. (Special). - At Thomaston, Maine the schooner Ella Pressy and schooner Francis Shubert of St. John were sunk by collision.

The captain and mate of the Maine schooner were drowned.

NO HOPE FOR BURIED MINERS.

PITTSBURG, Jan. 26. (Special). - The relatives of 180 miners entombed in the Harwick mine have abandoned all hope that any are alive.

FIFTEEN MINERS KILLED.

VICTORIA, Jan. 26. (Special). - By the fall of a cage in Stratton mine fifteen miners were killed.

BRILLIANT DALHOUSIE GRADUATE KILLED

The death of Charles Munro Pasa, the brilliant young Dalhousie graduate who was accidentally killed at Trinidad a few days ago, will be learned by many in this city with deep regret. Recent Trinidad papers contain touching references to his death.

The late Mr. Pasa, though still young in years - barely twenty-seven - had given unusual promise of a useful life. He entered Dalhousie from his Trinidad home seven years ago and while taking his Arts course at the Maritime University he was looked upon as a remarkable student. He won distinction particularly in Physics under the direction of the renowned Professor McGregor. Three years ago he received his B. A. degree with high honors in Physics and Mathematics and the Sir William Young gold medal. He then continued his studies at Harvard, where upon recommendations of his Dalhousie Professors he was awarded a valuable scholarship. At Harvard too he distinguished himself. From Harvard he returned to his native place, Port of Spain, Trinidad, and was appointed to the responsible position of Principal of Naparima College, where

SENTENCED TO PENAL SERVICE

Whittaker Wright was Taken Ill Suddenly

Believed to Have Taken Poison - Cabinet Changes Denied - Chicago People Held for the Grand Jury.

WHITAKER WRIGHT'S SUICIDE.

LONDON, Jan. 26. (Special). - Whitaker Wright, who was today sentenced to penal servitude was taken suddenly ill while being led from the Court and died in an hour.

HE IS BELIEVED TO HAVE TAKEN POISON.

RUMOR OF CABINET CHANGES DENIED. The rumors of further Cabinet resignations are denied by Ministers.

OFFICIALS ARRESTED FOR NEGLIGENCE.

CHICAGO, Jan. 26. (Special). - Mayor Harrison, Fire Chief Musham, Buildings Commissioner Williams and other public officials are arrested to await the action of the Grand Jury in connection with the triquois Theatre fire.

Ernest Coffin of this city is at present teaching. Some days ago during the progress of a regatta, of which he was Secretary, and in which he took part in a four oared team, occurred his untimely and accidental death. A small cannon was used for starting the races; after several starts had been made by the discharges, one of the fuses refused to work and, it was supposed, had failed to burn. Mr. Pasa a few moments later passed in front of the gun to congratulate a friend who was climbing up the wharf just after winning a "single skull" race; as he passed close to the mouth of the gun the smoldering fuse ignited, the charge exploded, in an instant completely blew his head from his body and hurled the latter into the sea.

Mr. Pasa was a remarkable athlete as well as a brilliant student and during his Dalhousie days he was recognized as one of the best athletes in the Maritime Provinces on the football field and on the track. He was a prominent member of the Wanderers Athletic Club and contributed no little to the athletic success of that organization during the vacations he spent in Halifax. In 1900, when the Abegweits for the first time in their history defeated the Wanderers at the Mar time Championships, he was one of the most prominent members of the Halifax team. Citizens who witnessed these sports will remember kindly the unassuming gentlemanly student, who after determined struggles won so many points for his team in the different runs, and will sincerely regret the untimely closing of a bright young life which gave such unusual promise to its brief but strenuous career.
