Sometimes when driving at about twenty miles an hour, the gasoline mixture apparently becomes too thin, making it necessary to pull out the choke to keep the engine running. Usually this is due to an air leak at some place which does not manifest itself until the motor becomes hot. When this condition presents itself, it is well to see that the manifold joints are tight, as well as all of the spark plugs and other points where an air leak could possibly occur.
