—A LAND MARK GONE.—By the sudden and unexpected death of Robert Ellis, Genl., which occurred at his home at O'Leary Station on Friday the 23rd, January another of the old landmarks has been removed. Another link connecting the present with the past has been severed and another home has been called upon to mourn the loss of a kind and industrious parent. The deceased was a son of the late James Ellis, shipbuilder. Bideford was born there about 85 years ago. When quite a young man he bought a wilderness farm on the O'Leary road about two miles from the West Shore and when times were dull in the shipyards at Bideford he would shoulder his axe and walk to Lot 7 a distance of about 30 miles and chop down and clear up the land on his new farm. Possessed of a remarkable strong constitution he was capable of enduring much hardship and it was not long till his hard honest toil was rewarded by fields of waving grain. He soon

built a house and barn and after a few years he married Harriet, daughter of the late John Raynor, Travelers Rest. In the early seventies, about the year the Govt. took over the P. E. I. Railway, he built a dwelling and shop at O'Leary station and moved to the farm conducting a merchandise business for a number of years and being a far-sighted man he bought several hundred acres of land in the vicinity of the station and with his usual pioneer thrift and industry the barrens of O'Leary were made to yield in abundance and the wilderness to blossom like a rose. He was Postmaster at O'Leary station for a quarter of a century and only resigned the position about six months before his death. In the winter of 1884 he was called upon to mourn the loss of his worthy partner in life and mother and two daughters and three sons who survive him. He is also survived by his wife of the second marriage Annie, daughter of the late James Waite, Springfield, and three sons and three daughters. In the Methodist Cemetery at Bethel the Rev. Mr. Sellers officiating in full view of the old Homestead now owned by his eldest son Heber, all that was mortal of one who truly exemplified in his life the words of the poet. An honest man the noblest work of God; was laid to rest beside the loving wife who climbed the hill together with him when on the sunny side of life but who passed away before the star of hope had reached its meridian.—F.

TO CONCILIATE NORTH IRELAND

(Canadian Press.)

LONDON, Feb. 2.—John Redmond, Irish Nationalist Leader, with Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary of Ireland were closeted today with Premier Asquith at his official residence on Downing Street. It is understood the Government is determined to make another effort to Conciliate Ulster, before heated debates in Parliament fan into a blaze the admittedly dangerous situation in the Northern Province of Ireland. It is generally thought that Mr. Redmond holds the key to the situation. It is pointed out that he is willing to go to the same lengths as Mr. Asquith and members of the Cabinet are ready to advance in order to placate the North of Ireland and that threats of Civil War in that country be averted. Unionists say they are not surprised to see Premier Asquith yielding before the Home Rule Bill is again reached.

AN IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT

MONTREAL, Feb. 2.—The progress of the movement in Britain toward the idea of an Imperial Parliament was outlined before the Canadian Club here today by J. Norton Griffiths M.P., of England. He said the present aim is to have the whole Empire unite in a demand to have a Council for protection and welfare.

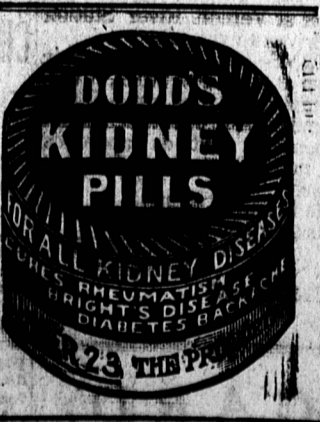

RADIUM FAILS TO CURE CANCER

(Canadian Press.)

BALTIMORE, Md., Feb. 2.—Congressman R. G. Bremner of New Jersey who had the entire supply of radium possessed by Dr. H. A. Kelly valued at \$100,000 placed in a cancer last December is dying. It is announced tonight that complications have arisen and death is a matter of only a few days or hours, only the inevitable will of the Congressman keeping him alive.

Mr. Bremner rallied this morning from his weakened condition of yesterday and insisted on working on the Bill he has before Congress. When Bremner consulted Dr. Kelly in December he was told the cancer was so large that it did not lend itself well to the radium treatment. It is understood that neither Dr. Kelly nor his assistant, Dr. Burnham, had been sanguine about a cure but the Congressman's Optimism Communicated itself to all with whom he came in contact. Four years ago he began to feel the pain of the cancer but thought it something else. In a few months he learned its deadly nature and Physicians in this country and Europe tried in vain to cure him.
