THE Guardian regrets to record the death of James Luther Division of West S. Peters, which took place there yesterday about noon. Deceased was a brother of J. M. Davison banker and of H. M. Davison City Clerk. He had been for some months ill, and returned from Montreal about a month ago, where he had been for treatment. Mr. Davison and five children are left to mourn. The deceased's father, mother and three brothers have died within the past three years - a series of sad bereavements which have called forth widespread sympathy.

During the lobster season about one hundred factories were running on Prince Edward Island. In the early spring the catches were very large and in consequence a number of factories attempted to handle more than they could pack. There has accordingly been considerable complaint as to quality. A few additional hands at the height of the season would have averted the difficulty, but the industrial activity which prevailed rendered it impossible to get additional help in the emergency. In future packers will take precautions to avoid a recurrence of such conditions. -Maritime Merchant.

ABOUT eight o'clock Friday morning the dwelling house of Mal. D. McDonald of Kinross, was burned to the ground. A high wind was blowing at the time and the flames made such rapid progress that there was but very little time in which to save any of the household effects. Neighbors rushed to the scene and did all in their power, but it was not of much avail as the flames had got so much headway that hardly anything, except an organ and a few bedsteads, was saved. It is understood that the building was not insured, and that besides the loss of furniture and clothing, etc., there was a considerable sum of cash destroyed by the flames. The origin of the fire is not known unless it was caused by a burning kane.

THE Halifax Herald speaking of Island markets says: -Butter remains steady at prices last reported. The supply is still small. The majority of the cheese factories are still in operation. This is due to the high price of cheese, September being now all sold at an average price of from 10 9/10 to 11c. The output this year will be in the neighborhood of 30,000 boxes as compared with last year. On the whole the average price has been considerably ahead of that of last season. It to be regretted that, with the prevailing high prices, the make is so small, because the quantity produced on the Island even if it were five times a great would not have affected the market. The quality of the fall cheese has been exceptionally good, owing to the excellent condition of the pasture. The butter output has been largely increased this season very little having been sold under 20c.

That portion of Jessie MacLachlan's Canadian tour, under the management of F. G. Spencer, of St. John, and which has been so decidedly successful, concluded in Charlottetown Friday evening with a climax that was all that could be desired. The Opera House was crowded to hear the great Scotch prima donna, and her success in this, her first appearance in Calais, was so great that the audience were almost too enthusiastic in their demand for encores. The reception which followed Miss MacLachlan's wonderful rendition of Rule Britannia could hardly be exceeded in British territory. Miss MacLachlan and her husband will leave in the morning for Montreal, where their Upper Canadian tour begins.
