Big Program For Tonight

This evening will be the "big noise" of the Army Week program. It will feature a parade in which three bands and upwards of 1,200 will take part. It will be larger than the Torch celebration last year as in addition to the units there will be a number of military vehicles. The parade will enter the Exhibition Grounds by the eastern or stock entrance leaving the other entrances free for the public. It will be before eight o'clock, they will arrive on the race track and, headed by the bands, will march down towards the Grand Stand, arriving in the centre of the Grand Stand the Officer Commanding, Lt.-Col. F. I. Andrew, M.M., will give the "Eyes Right" and the salute will be taken by His Honor, Lieutenant Governor, B. W. LePage standing in the centre of the Grand Stand. Two of the bands will then break off but continue to play to assist in the broadcast. The parade, headed by one band will march around the track, completing the full half mile and break off when the head of the column is opposite the east bleacher. This parade will be one well worth witnessing by everyone in Charlottetown and vicinity.

A sports program will then take place consisting of 100-yard dash, relay race, gas-mask race, tug-of-war, etc. Teams from the army, navy and air force will take part in the latter. The Red Cross will give a demonstration and a number of songs, band music and other features will keep everything going in a lively manner. A realistic modern infantry attack which will use smoke bombs, flashes and fireworks, used will end in the capture of a pill-box to conclude an evening show such as citizens have never yet seen. The grounds are free to all but citizens and children are respectively requested to sit themselves in the Grand Stand and Bleachers. The race track and centre field must be left for the use of the military and others taking part in the program.

There is accommodation for 8,000 to 10,000 people—so come one, come all and see the army boys demonstrate.

This Evening's Program
7.15 p. m.—A grand parade headed by Military Bands and consisting of detachments from the 17th (Reserve) Armoured Regiment, 204th (Reserve) Field Battery, R.C.A. 6th (Reserve) District Signals, R.C. C. S., No. 62 Canadian Army (Basic) Training Centre, Canadian Legion, B. E. S. L., Canadian Red Cross Corps, and City Firemen will proceed from the Armouries to the Provincial Exhibition Grounds.

8.00 p. m.—A broadcast will be featured by OFCY direct from the Grand Stand of the Provincial Exhibition. This broadcast will feature a description of the "March Past" of the various Prince Edward Island Units. Following this the programme will consist of various musical selections, Demonstration by the Canadian Red Cross Corps, and a Sports programme consisting of relay races, tug-of-war, between the Navy, Army and Air Force teams, etc.

War—25 Years Ago Today
(BY THE CANADIAN PRESS)

Death of Mr. J. M. Hunter Yesterday

The death occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday morning of Mr. John Marshall Hunter, well known architect of this city, who had been a patient in the hospital since last Friday when he was taken suddenly ill. Mr. Hunter was the second son of Mr. Watson Hunter, lawyer and city clerk of Lennoxton in Lanarkshire, Scotland. He served his apprenticeship as architect with one of the leading firms in Glasgow, whose specialty was church and cathedral erections. When he had completed his course and qualified as an architect he accepted an offer from the Canadian Pacific Railway through its Glasgow representative to proceed to Montreal to join the draughtsman staff of the Railway, which was extending its building operations not only throughout Canada but in Europe as well. While so employed, Mr. Hunter was invited by a leading firm of Montreal architects which specialized in church and home architecture, to join them. This he did, and one of his first and most important assignments was to prepare plans and supervise the reconstruction of St. Dunstan's cathedral (now St. Dunstan's Basilica) in Charlottetown, which had then recently been destroyed by fire. He came here in March, 1912 and carried out this work with great satisfaction to all concerned. At its conclusion he planned to open an office of his own in Charlottetown, when he was approached by the late Mr. C.B. Chappell, who offered him a partnership. This offer Mr. Hunter accepted, and the firm was thereafter known as Chappell and Hunter, architects. They carried out many important undertakings in ecclesiastical and hospital construction, both in this Province and on the mainland. When the returned soldiers' hospital was ordered for Charlottetown and Government House was put in the disposal of the Government for that purpose by Lieut. Governor Macdonald, the firm of Chappell and Hunter was entrusted with the work of erecting temporary buildings. Later, when it was decided to build a hospital to replace the old City Hospital, the plans of this firm were accepted and the present handsome building is the result.
