THE MILK TEST—Out of seventeen samples of milk taken from milkmen in Charlottetown by Dr. K. W. McKinnon, Veterinary Inspector, several days ago, only three were below standard, a marked improvement over the last test, some samples showing as high as 5 per cent.

AN OLD LAND MARK—The southern half of the large wooden building on Great George Street occupied by J. G. Carver and others is being torn down. This building is a link between the old and the present day Charlottetown. Constructed some 75 years ago it has some interesting history. The building was erected by the late John Thomas, Thomas on land rented from the Messrs Peter W. and John W. Robinson of Robinson's Island, Brackley Point. The lease of the land was for 21 years at the end of which time the building thereon reverted to the Messrs Robinson, Mr. Thomas conducted a very large general business for many years, later on selling out by auction, the auctioneer being the late Wm. Dodd, and this being his first auction conducted in Charlottetown. All this took place in the late 50's. The late W. E. Dawson was the service of Mr. Thomas, later being taken into partnership. After Mr. Thomas sold out he returned home to his native place, England and Mr. Dawson embarked in business on his own account.
