MEXICAN ELECTIONS STILL IN DOUBT

MEXICO CITY, Mex., via Galveston, Tex., Oct. 3—Little definite information on the result of yesterday's election came today and progressive party leaders with the meagre returns are able to do little more than guess the result. The

chairman of the Central Committee expressed the opinion that the Madro-Pino Suarez ticket had triumphed all down the line, but when asked for figures he could produce none. Numerous telegrams from all parts of the republic were received, but they contained only sweeping assertions that the victory had been general in the particular section from which the message was sent.

General Madero takes the situation calmly and expresses the assurance that his running mate had been elected. At progressive party headquarters the hope was expressed that perhaps enough data could be collected by tomorrow to warrant preliminary figures on how the election had gone in the federal districts.

Dr. Francisco Vasquez Gomez, candidate for vice-president, stated today that he had received telegrams which indicated that he had carried the States of Puebla, Coahuila and Chihuahua, and added that there was nothing to indicate that he should admit a defeat.

At Catholic party headquarters there is an equal absence of figures on the result, although they assert there is no doubt that President De-La Bara will be the next vice-president. Some after-election enthusiasm is being shown by the working classes, who have engaged in demonstrations in the streets and appeared before progressive party headquarters where they were addressed by local orators.
