SUDDEN DEATH—Monday afternoon William Cameron, one of the most respected citizens of Fraser Mountain, was found dead in one of the fields he had worked in all his life says the Pictou Advocate. He had been engaged in ploughing, and before quitting the operation went to the mail box and was evidently on his return to the team and plough when he suddenly dropped dead. Heart failure is thought to have been the cause. He was 73 years of age and all his years had lived on the homestead, with its stone house on Fraser's Mountain. Few men were held in more general respect than William Cameron, who was a friend of all who knew him and who earned the regard of his neighbors and fellow farmers for miles around. He was unmarried and is survived by two brothers, Daniel, of Thorburn, and John, who also lived at the old homestead. His only surviving sister is Mrs. M. Kinnon, who resides in Prince Edward Island.

MONTREAL HERALD FIGHT IS OVER

MONTREAL, Nov. 2.—The legal fight between D. Lorne McGibbon to obtain publication of the Montreal Herald under the Herald Publishing Company, instead of permitting Lord Atholstan, proprietor of the Montreal Daily Star, who owns a large share of the Herald stock, to get possession of the paper and have it published by the British American Publishing Company (formed for this special purpose) has been settled out of court, and the Herald stays in staying. Injunction proceedings were recently taken in the name of a minority shareholder, S. J. Le Huray, to prevent the transfer of the machinery and plant of the Herald to the British American Publishing Company on a case that became effective before the legal machinery was set going and the matter was to have come up in the Superior Court here today, but the injunction proceedings are off now. Mr. McGibbon is a shareholder in the Herald, and Mr. Le Huray represented his interests in the application for the injunction.

NEW YORK CITY IN GROCERY BUSINESS

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—New York City has entered the coal and grocery business. The right to use the public funds to help reduce the high cost of food was granted yesterday by the State Food Commission despite the objections of representatives of 50,000 retail food dealers. These dealers asserted that they did not think the city could improve the situation by entering the field. The buying, selling and storing of food and fuel is now in the hands of Dr. Henry Maskowitz, head of the recently appointed city market commission. He has the power to take over such necessities as conditions may require.

CALGARY MILK DEALERS RECORD

CALGARY, Nov. 3.—Despite recent order of the Food Controller, Calgary milk dealers today boosted the price of milk to 15 cents for single quarts or eight quarts for \$1. It is understood that the civil officials will appeal to the Food Controller.

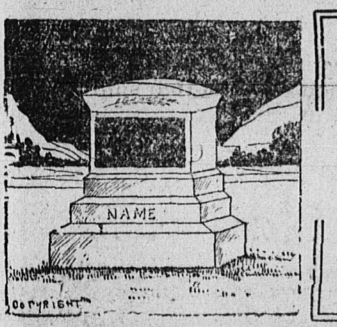

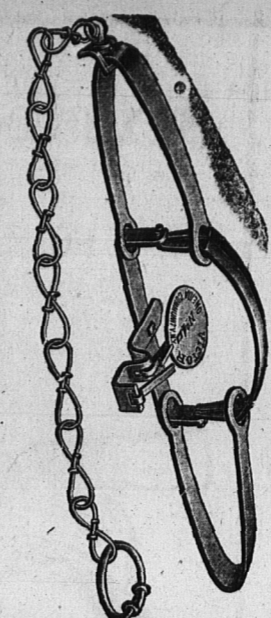

DOCTOR BELAND ENJOYS GOOD HEALTH

LONDON, Nov. 3.—The Canadian Associated Press has had an interview with a civilian just escaped from Germany, who was an intimate fellow-prisoner of Dr. Beland, former Postmaster-General.

This gentleman escaped after the third attempt, having twice served periods of solitary confinement as a punishment for his previous endeavours. Doctor Beland, he says, enjoys good health and did not originally live in prison, but has done so since June, although he is allowed out twice weekly under guard, and seems to have recovered his spirits a good deal after the blow of his wife's death. The news of her death, says this informant was kept from Dr. Beland for three days, apparently so that he should not have a good excuse for asking to go to Belgium to attend the funeral.
