(Special to the Guardian) WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Government acquisition and control of all the principal stock yards, cold storage plants and warehouses and both refrigerator and cattle cars has been recommended to the President by the Federal Trade Commission to destroy a monopoly which it declares Swift & Co., Armour & Co., Morris & Co., Wilson & Co., and the Cudahy Packing Co., exercise not only over meat of the country, but other necessary food supplies.

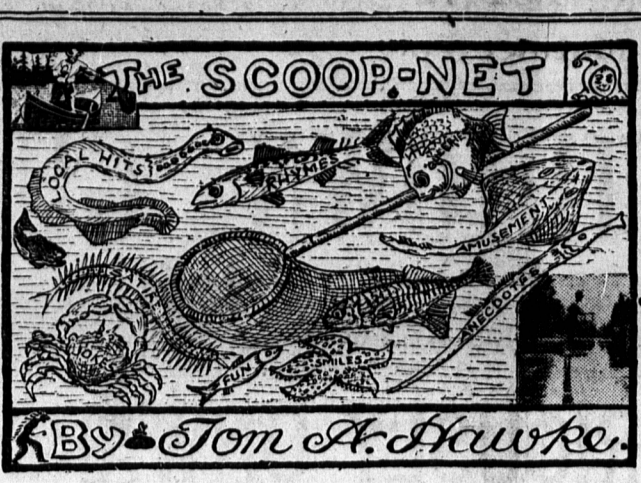
