They would have perished had not been for the generosity of the native Indians who took them into their wigwams and kept them alive with warm meal bread supplemented with oysters and clams which they had to dig from under the ice at Malpeque Bay. The history of the wreck of the Annapolis and subsequent thriving of the emigrants and building of the first church at Malpeque was most graphically and graphically described in an article in The Morning Guardian a short time previous to the Memorial Centenary celebration which took place recently and which was written by none other than the Reverend Mr. Ramsay above mentioned, who wields a facile pen and in fact all attitude of interest to all Islanders and abroad, in addition to all lovers of the history of pioneer life in North America. First Maritime Grand Encampment

In connection with the annual convention of the Oddfellows Grand Lodge of the Maritime Provinces and Newfoundland at Fredericton this week the Fredericton Daily Gleaner publishes the following interesting historical note:

Ross, of Mount Carmel Encampment, No. 15, Moncton, N. B.; John A. Craig, Yarmouth Encampment, No. 16, Yarmouth, N. S.; Samuel Watts and John Barpee, of Meductic Encampment, No. 17, Woodstock, N. B.

Craig, Yarmouth Encampment, No. 16, Yarmouth, N. S.; Grand Scribe, J. C. P. Frazer, of Halifax Encampment, No. 12, Halifax, N. S.; Junior Warden, S. T. Rogers, of Mount Carmel Encampment, No. 15, Moncton, N. B.

The appointed officers were: T. L. Chappell, of Port La Jolie Encampment, No. 13, Charlottetown, P. E. I.; Grand Marshal, Charles H. Webb, of Mount Carmel Encampment, No. 15, Moncton, N. B.; Grand Sentinel, B. S. Knowles, of Belvedere Encampment, No. 14, Windsor, N. S.; Grand Outside Sentinel, Benjamin Brenner, elected Grand Representative to the S. G. L. which met that year in the city of Portland, Oregon, and was re-elected to that office for three succeeding years. At this meeting of the Grand Encampment several Subordinate Encampments were re-numbered as at present.
