### JERSEY CLASS LEADERS

The high record made by a Jersey cow in Canada was that completed by the 2 year old heifer **Brampton Basile's Molly**—122471—bred and owned by B. H. Bull & Son, Brampton, Ontario. Molly produced, on three times milking in 325 days, 13,753 lbs. of milk, 755 lbs. of fat, qualifying for both gold and silver medals. She is a daughter of the Superior sire, **Brampton Basileus**.  
The high two year old on twice a-day milking was **Higginet Observed**—119288—owned by A. A. Ellis, Higginet, Ontario. She produced 10,872 lbs. of milk and 631 lbs. of fat.  
Ontario also had the high three year old on two times milking when **Harrow Design's Dora**—111559—owned by Carl H. Smith, Harrow, Ontario, won a gold and silver medal certificate for her production of 11,820 lbs. of milk and 602 lbs. of fat.  
The 4 year old on two times milking, **Prince Edward Island** comes to the front with **Wonderful Standard's Maid**—101681—owned by Stuart Bros., Charlottetown, producing 11,735 lbs. of milk and 731 lbs. of fat. On three times a-day milking in the same class **Alerte de la B. C.**—103491—owned by S. R. Bedard, Charlottetown, Quebec, was the winner with 9722 lbs. of milk and 542 lbs. of fat.

## Army Cadet Corps News

**NOTES**  
The annual inspection of Army Cadets is planned for May 4 or 5. The Cadet Band led the parade on Thursday and Friday last week, and received much favorable comment.  
On Thursday of this week all the platoons will parade. On Friday, Platoons 4 and 5 will have their regular parade.

**MEDALS**  
**Distinguished Flying Medal**—This decoration is granted to non-commissioned officers and men of the Air Force for acts similar to those described under the Distinguished Flying Cross. The ribbon is eighteen alternate diagonal purple and white bars of equal breadth.  
**Air Force Medal**—This medal is the counterpart of the Air Force Cross and was instituted to reward non-commissioned officers and men, and individuals not belonging to the Air Force, for acts and services to aviation. The ribbon is made up of eighteen alternate diagonal red and white bars of equal breadth.  
**War Medals**—The war medals now commonly worn are the 1914 star; the 1914-15 star, which is the same as the 1914 star without the metal rosette; the war medal, the Victory Medal.

**Jubilee and Coronation Medals**—Medals commemorative of the various Jubilees and Coronations follow in precedence the war and campaign medals described in the previous paragraph.

### METHOD OF WEARING DECORATIONS

When worn with service or undress uniforms the ribbons of decorations only are worn. They are worn on the left breast above the tunic pocket with the senior decoration nearest the centre of the body. In cases where the decorations are too many to be worn in one row, they will be worn in two or three rows with the order of precedence descending from the top. The medals and decorations described in this column have been enumerated in the order in which they will be worn.
