## Calder highly Pleased with Announcement

MONTREAL, Sept. 15—(CP)—The go-ahead signal for continuation of professional sport in war-time was received with satisfaction by members of the National Hockey League both in Canada and the United States.

President Frank Calder, who has guided the League's destinies since its inception in 1917, seemed highly pleased with the announcement of approval made earlier in the day at Ottawa, and he said that "now we have the green light we can plan ahead."

Mr. Calder said he had anticipated that no special consideration would be given under mobilization regulations to professional athletes. The clubs will have to rely on young players up to 19 years of age and those players who are married or otherwise not required for active service.

## Seeks \$500 Damages For Barber Shop

Evidence was completed in the damage case of H. E. Cantwell, Charlottetown, vs. Mrs. Ada Grant, West Royalty, which opened in the Queen's County Court before His Honor, Judge G. Gavan Duffy yesterday morning. Seven witnesses testified in the case which arose out of damage to the plaintiff's barber shop caused by the collapse of a brick wall on the west side King Edward Hotel early in the morning of March 7.

The plaintiff, Cantwell, is seeking \$500 damages in the case which was adjourned at 2 p.m. and will resume at 11 o'clock this morning. At that time counsel for plaintiff and defendant will present legal argument.

Witnesses giving evidence at the hearing were: Herbert E. Cantwell, Charlottetown; Russell Jenkins, proprietor of the King Edward Hotel; Borden Myers, St. Avaris; Judson McEachern, Appin Road, Charlottetown; and Morley Bell, Charlottetown, for the plaintiff; and Mrs. H. E. Cantwell, Charlottetown, for the defendant. Mr. H. E. Cantwell left his barber shop on the evening of March 6 at 8:30 p.m. and left everything in order. At 7:30 a.m. next morning he was summoned to the building and found that most of the brick wall on the west side of the King Edward Hotel, which adjoined the shop, had fallen on the roof and crushed it to the floor, destroying most of the furnishings and fixtures.

## Norwegian Sea Captain Here

Captain Air Kaldager, veteran Norwegian sea captain, is in Charlottetown at present visiting his son and his daughter-in-law. He is also getting a well-earned rest from the sea recuperating from a recent operation which he underwent in Toronto.

Captain Kaldager has not been in his native Norway since 1937. When the Germans invaded his homeland he was one day's run out of Montevideo with a cargo of grain from Buenos Aires which was destined for Oslo. Learning by wireless of the disaster which hit his country, he put back into port and eventually discharged his cargo in Liverpool, Eng.

## Noted A.P. War Correspondent Believed Prisoner

CAIRO, Sept. 15—(AP)—Lynn Allen, The Associated Press War Correspondent who established the current Pultz prize for the best national reporting on 100,000 miles of hazardous operations with the British Mediterranean fleet, was believed reported today to be a prisoner-of-war.

For the first time since the 34-year-old AP man argued down in the field of sustained sea-going home to Alexandria today without him. The best information available here was that he fell into the hands of the Axis forces during the Tunisian raid last Sunday night and Monday morning in which the fleet took part with an offshore bombardment. Allen had gone along with the naval task force to Tobruk just as the last two years in the course of gagement of the Royal Navy in the Mediterranean.
