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THE SCOTT ACT IN PRINCE COUNTY

Yesterday's Election Shows Nearly Two to One for Repeal — Summerside gives Handsome Repeal Majority — With 35 Polls Heard from Vote Stands 2462 to 1298

SUMMERSIDE, February 1.—(Special)—The voting for and against the Scott Act today passed off quietly but was contested by the respective parties at every poll with considerable spirit. The temperance people here are much gratified with the majority of 170 scored in favor of prohibition in Summerside. Of 35 polls heard from 29 gave majorities for repeal while six gave majorities for the Act. In the polls heard from 2,700 votes are recorded, 1298 for and 2,462 against the Scott Act, a prohibition majority of 1164. This will be increased by returns from the remaining polls. The total number of votes polled will probably run close to 5,000. Following are the returns by polling divisions:

ASSAULT CASE LOT 48 ROAD

The case of Vernon Stewart against Frank Ferguson came before Stipendiary Brehaut yesterday afternoon. The defendant was arrested on January 29th and remanded to jail till Tuesday, and then was further remanded to yesterday. Ferguson was charged with assaulting Stewart at his saw mill, Lot 48 Road on January 23. The evidence was furnished by Roderick McNeill and Henry Wood and the facts proved were about as follows. Ferguson had claimed that Stewart had acted in a discreditable manner toward a certain member of his family and had used threatening language toward him. On December 23 he was passing the saw mill and Stewart happened to shout out to McNeill. Ferguson evidently thought it was to him, as he came up. Stewart then picked up a handspike. Thereupon Ferguson abused him and said "for two pins I would throw you across the saw and cut you in two." A. J. B. Mellish appeared for the defendant and argued that these words did not constitute an assault. He claimed that there must be an unequalled threat and the power to carry it out. His Honor adjourned the case to Saturday for judgment, in the meantime remanding the defendant to prison.

SERIOUS FAMINE IN NORTH JAPAN

Thousands Suffering From Starvation, Many Dead and Others are Dying.

VICTORIA, Feb. 1.—(Special)—Advice from Japan by the S. S. Empress of Japan say that famine conditions in North Japan are becoming awful and thousands are suffering from starvation. A large number of deaths have occurred and many others are dying. The Government is organizing relief and foreign committees are distributing rice in the famine districts. One third of the population of 2,800,000 in three stricken provinces are in distress.

Norton, James Steele, Angus Des Roche, Charles Chandler. The following nominations were made—For Mayor, Dr. Kelly, Jas. Paton. For Councillors—D. L. Hooper, B. Rogers, Jr., Charles Chandler, S. A. McDonald. Mayor Kelly intimated that if elected he would continue to follow the course he has hitherto pursued with regard to city affairs and would be in favor of continuing the construction of permanent improvements. Councillor Paton made a most favorable impression and spoke in favor of the principles which, in his card to the electors, he has pledged himself to support. He was quite decided in his opinion that the permanent improvements to the city should be continued in the future. The various nominees for Councillors discussed civic matters from the different points of view and the support of the audience at times forcibly expressed was impartially bestowed.

RESISTANCE TO THE GOVERNMENT

In Putting the Church and State Bill in Operation in France—Conflicts with Police and Guards, Churches Barricaded and Many Hurt.

PARIS, Feb. 1.—(Special)—Everywhere in France the actual putting into operation of the church and state separation bill has aroused a storm of protest. In several provincial parishes Catholics have gathered in churches and made such strong resistance that the Government Commissioners were unable to enter the buildings to make inventories. In Paris today violent scenes took place. At the church of St. Clothilde an armed Government force dispersed the congregation and in other city parishes squadrons of police were found necessary. At one church fifty police and guards were hurt and a larger number of church members while a hundred and fifty were arrested. Barricades were erected in some churches and the people were armed with sword-sticks. After the crowd had been ejected a triple row of guards armed with rifles was stationed around the choir to preserve order.

INTERCOLONIAL SHOWS SURPLUS

For December for First Time in its History, November also Showing Well—Brodeur to be Appointed Minister of Marine and Fisheries Today.

MONCTON, Feb. 1.—(Special)—Present indications are that the Intercolonial Railway for the month of December last shows a surplus of about six thousand dollars. It is claimed that this is the first time in the history of the I. C. R. that it has shown a surplus for December and that had it not been that bills for a special expenditure on reconstruction for a large amount made during the fall come in at the close of the month, November also would have shown a surplus.

BALFOUR TO RUN FOR LONDON SEAT

LONDON, Jan. 30.—At a meeting of the Conservative Association of the City of London yesterday the resignation of A. G. Gibbs, member of Parliament for the city of London, was accepted and the candidature of Arthur J. Balfour for that constituency was approved. The Liberal Association of the city of London also met today and postponed until Friday its decision whether to oppose the former Premier. Several Liberals expressed willingness to contest the seat. Three more Liberals and two Conservatives were returned as the result of Saturday's elections.

MINE WORKERS PLAN BIG STRIKE

They Refuse All Proposals of Mine Owners and Raise A Large Fund

INDIANAPOLIS, Feb. 1.—(Special)—A convention of miners today flatly rejected all proposals made by the mine owners and declared that nothing would be accepted but full compliance with the demands made by the men.

At the same time the first steps were taken for the accumulation of a fund of six and a half millions to be added to the present International Union's fund to carry on a strike.
It is probable that this action will result in the greatest mining strike in history.

KING EDWARD HAS RECOVERED

LONDON, Jan. 30.—King Edward, who since the accident in November last when he fractured his ankle has been spending most of his time at country homes, will come to London today. It is learned that the injury to his ankle was more serious than reported at the time. It has required almost continuous rest, and most careful treatment, but His Majesty now has almost entirely recovered. His health otherwise is excellent. He pursues an active outdoor life as much as possible. Even while suffering from his injured ankle, he continues shooting from a cart or automobile.
