Among these home-produced foods honey is one that deserves a more prominent place on Canadian tables. Not only has nature been generous in giving our beekeepers a good honey crop, but the quality is unusually high, so high that the recent display show in London it was adjudged the finest in the Empire.

During the Christmas and New Year season when Canadian tables will be glistening with a multitude of good things to eat, it should not be necessary to go outside the Dominion for things to delight the eye and tempt the palate. Not only is honey a delicious food when eaten with bread, toast or hot biscuits, but it may be used to sweeten any or a excellent in cakes, puddings, sauces and in fillings for pies and tarts. Any housewife may use honey in her own favorite Christmas recipes, just keeping in mind the following points: When substituting for sugar because the liquid in the recipe by 1-1 cup for each cup of honey used. In flour mixtures the acid in honey may be neutralized by using from 1-8 to 1-4 tsp. baking soda for every cup of honey and then lessen the amount of baking powder by about 1-2 spoonful.
