MRS. BERTRAM AULD

There passed calmly to her eternal reward, at her home in Kingston, on April 17, 1947, Jessie Margaret Ward, beloved wife of Bertram R. Auld in her 76th year, leaving many relatives and a legion of friends to mourn her demise. She had been in failing health for several months. A period of hospitalization last summer, while doubtless prolonging her stay with loved ones on earth, failed to bring a return to her usual good health.
