SOUTH AMERICA HAS ANOTHER LIKELY CHAMP

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—South America has sent forth another pugilistic conqueror, who in class may rival the meteoric rise of Louis Angel Firpo in heavyweight ranks. The newcomer is Louis Vincentino, Chilean lightweight, who, since arriving in the United States in September, knocked out three opponents in rapid succession.

Vicentino's performances have attracted attention, chiefly because of his ring workmanship rather than the calibre of his opposition.

PARIS, December 5.—Deaf mutes from twenty nations will hold their Olympic Games in Paris next August. The French organizing committee has received assurance that there will be 400 participants in all branches of sport for prizes totalling more than \$5,000, which include scholarships in deaf and dumb institutions for the leading point winners.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Batting Siki, the singular Senegalese, who achieved pugilistic fame by knocking out Georges Carpentier, provided Broadway with a thrill today with the aid of a quantity of synthetic gin, a wrinkled dress suit and a pair of expensive patent leather shoes.

He obviously had made a night of it and part of the day when he appeared on Broadway at 44th St. He craved attention. So he emitted one of his native war cries. He got attention. He moved up a block to 45th street, taking his audience and his enthusiasm with him. It was Siki's first escape from his manager in a week. His last adventure occurred when he fled his training camp with \$1,000 which he rolled away in a flood of alcohol.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5.—Old "Pop" Geers is in the limelight again.

Peter Manning, the great son of Azoff has been sent to his winter stable at Memphis, Tenn., and for the next year at any rate Geers will train and drive him and try to make him break his record of 1:56.3.

Manning is another of a small, select bunch of American geldings which have made names for themselves. He did not see a racetrack till he was three years old in 1920, when the great owner-driver Murphy won a sensational trotting race with him in 2:03 1/2.

Although Murphy bought him from Harry Putnam another well-known harness man he was acting at the time for Irving Gleason, who has sold him to a combination of men, of whom a nephew of "Pop" Geers is one.

Tom Murphy now is planning his faith to Rose Scott, a black mare who won the Junior Futurity in 1920, the Senior Futurity in 1921, and the Transylvania this year.

PRESIDENT CALDER HAS FULL POWER TO DEAL WITH HOCKEY ROWDIES

OTTAWA, Dec. 5.—The annual meeting of the National Hockey League, which took place at the Chateau Laurier Saturday afternoon, proved a peaceful affair, though there were a few fireworks displays, as usual, between the Ottawa and Canadian representatives.

The most important business done by the delegates was the passage of the Ottawa Hockey Association's amendment to the match penalty rule. The Ottawa club moved that the fine for a match penalty be increased from \$15 to \$50, and that any player deliberately injuring or disabling an opponent should be suspended and kept out of the game as long as President Calder saw fitting. After a lengthy discussion, the Ottawa motion was seconded by Charlie Querrie, of Toronto, and passed.

Leo Dandurand fought against the motion on the ground that it left too much authority in the hands of the officials, but Hamilton also favored the change and the resolution carried, after President Frank Ahearn, of the Ottawas, and Charlie Querrie, of Toronto, had passed bouquets of praise to Leo Dandurand for suspending Cleghorn and Coutu after their glaring fouls in the play off at Montreal last March. Hence any player committing a deliberate foul in the future suspends himself and will be kept out of the game as long as President Frank Calder sees fit. This, it is believed, will prove a great stride towards the elimination of rowdism.

Charles G. Annis Was Reinstated

NEW YORK, Dec. 5.—Charles G. Annis, of Nova Scotia, who was suspended off the tracks in 1912 for withdrawing an entry without official consent, was reinstated by the board of review of national trotting association at its meeting here today.

World Series in East.

There was no mention of the proposed international league, the N. H. L. delegates believe to be a mythical one, and action as regards Tom Duggan's franchises at New York and Boston was deferred.

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OLYMPIC ICE TEAMS WILL MEET JAN. 25

CHAMONIX, France, Dec. 5.—The Olympic hockey teams representing the United States and Canada will be placed at the head of the two series of teams entered for the competition here this winter, beginning Jan. 25. The total number of countries entered to date number eight and no further entries are expected.

Canada will lead the upper half of the draw, playing England in their first match and the winner of France and Norway in the semi-finals.

The Americans have a much harder road to travel in the lower half. They meet in the first round the team representing Sweden. Should they survive that round then they will have to face the

Point Out Error Re Olympic Games

PARIS, Dec. 5.—The games which will be held in Paris next year are often referred to as the eighth Olympic games. This is an error," says a semi-official communique issued by the French Olympic committee, sent to all the heads of Federations and clubs in France and abroad.

"The 1924 games are indeed the games of the eighth Olympiad, but not the eighth Olympic games. In reality they are only the seventh, just as Antwerp was the scene of the sixth. The sixth Olympic games originally scheduled to take place in Berlin never came off."
