The ten most useful years of my life as a missionary were those between the years of seventy and eighty, says Rev. W. F. Johnson, D. D. Sixty-three years ago he and his wife, sailed from Boston to begin their missionary service in India. Dr. Johnson, who is now 82 years of age, has contributed very largely to the literature made accessible to Indian Christians by translation and also by authorship, and in this field, perhaps, he has achieved his greatest success as a missionary. During the last ten years the simplified Hindi version of the four gospels was prepared and published, and fifty-three thousand of these have already been put into circulation.

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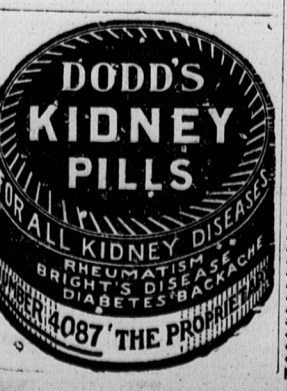
