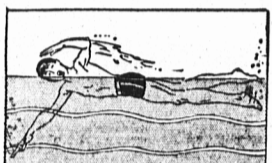
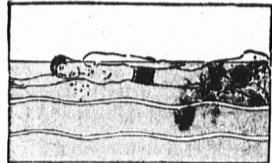

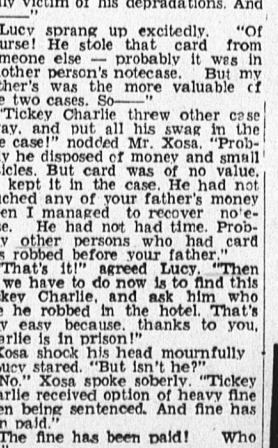

THE COOK'S CORNER

BUTTERSCOTCH SQUARES

First Part.

Three tablespoons butter, 1-2 cup brown sugar, yolks of 2 eggs, 3 tablespoons milk, 1 cup flour, 1-2 teaspoon baking powder, pinch salt.

Second Part.

Two egg-whites, 1-2 cups brown sugar, 1 cup chopped walnuts, 1-2 cup shredded coconut.

Mix first part like cake. Spread on bottom of a greased cake pan. Beat up egg-whites, add sugar, and fold in nuts and coconut. Place on top of first mixture and bake in moderate oven about 40 minutes. Cut in squares when cool.

CHICKEN MOUSSE WITH CELERY

6 tablespoons butter, 3-4 cup dry bread crumbs, 2 cups thin cream or evaporated milk, 3-8 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon nutmeg, 3 cups chopped celery, 6 eggs, slightly beaten, 1 cup diced celery 1-2 cup mayonnaise.

Melt butter in top of double boiler, add crumbs, cream, salt, nutmeg and cook 10 minutes stirring frequently. Mix chicken, eggs, together and stir in hot cream sauce. Pour into a well-greased mould in shape of pan of water, cover with sheet of waxed paper and bake in a moderate electric oven (350 degrees F.) 45 to 60 minutes, or until firm. Chopped celery and nutmeg with mayonnaise, pour around the mousse, or fill the centre of a ring mould. Serves 12 for a reception.

PARSLEY ROLLS.

2 cups flour 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 4-1-2 tablespoons shortening, 1 egg (slightly beaten), 1-2 cup milk (or enough to make 3-4 cup when added to the egg), 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley.

Mix dry ingredients together and cut in shortening until mixture becomes a coarse, mealy texture; stir in the liquid and chopped parsley, and turn out on a floured board. Knead the dough slightly or until smooth; and roll out to 1-4 thickness. Cut into small rounds, crease in centre with knife, brush with melted butter to which 1 tablespoon chopped parsley has been added and fold over like Parker House Rolls. Let stand 15 or 20 minutes. Bake in a hot oven (425 degrees F.) 10 to 15 minutes, or until brown. Makes 12 to 16 medium-size rolls.
