Church Union

The following from a Charlottetown Correspondent appears in The Toronto Mail and Empire of the 10th inst.

Would not Federal Union Be Better?

Sir.—When the provinces were united in 1867 a legislative union, which some preferred, was found impossible, and no one now regrets the fact. Might it not be that all that is desirable in church union could have been attained under a

federal union, leaving to each religious body so uniting its denominational name, its creed, its church buildings and educational properties, its present form of church government, its methods of providing pastors for its churches and administering its ordinances? Would not this have opened the way for other large Protestant bodies, Anglican and Baptist, to come in and in the end have united all the more important Protestant bodies? What a united church that would have been!

As it is the so-called union movement has unfortunately divided the grand old Presbyterian church into two hostile camps, whose relations are sadly embittered, and will be more so if the proposed federative legislation is enacted into law. As I am informed, fully one-third of the Presbyterian ministers and churches stand opposed to the proposed legislation, and they include as large a number of pastors and churches as are in the Congregational body which is to be taken in. Presbyterians who join the new united church will be deprived of one-third of their voting strength, as compared with the other uniting churches which will have their full strength. The unanimity with which the non-Presbyterian bodies accept the proposed legislation might well operate as a warning to Presbyterians to stay out until the basis of union is entirely recast. They know not what change of polity may soon be proposed and adopted in the united church, in deciding upon which they, with declimated voting power, will be outvoted. In such case the change of polity will inevitably carry them still farther away from their traditional moorings.

When the Free State was established in Ireland it gave its representation in the British Parliament. Ulster was more prudent, or shall we say, more loyal to its old faith and traditions, and held on to its representatives at Westminster. Those Presbyterians in Canada who are still loyal to their old faith are like their brethren in Ulster—unfavorable to such radical changes as would abolish their name, sever old connections and make their future church polity largely subject to the control of others whose opinions in such matters they do not share.
