—The Liberal Conservative Convention for the electoral district of Prince County, held at Summerside yesterday for the purpose of nominating a candidate to contest the riding at the next general election was one of the largest Conservative Conventions ever held in the county. Every division was well represented, there being 177 delegates out of 192 delegates present. Neil McQuarrie, K. C., president of the East Prince Liberal Conservative Association occupied the chair and Heath Strong was chosen as secretary. After the examining of the credentials of the candidates nominations were called for, of which there were two: A. A. Letoury, nominated by Frederick T. Compton, St. Eleanor's, seconded by Samuel Kennedy, O'Leary, and Dr. P. C. Murphy, Tignish; nominated by Edward Larkin, Tignish; seconded by James Morrissey, Skinner's considerable discussion as to the relative merits of each candidate took place and ended up in Dr. Murphy withdrawing and moving the motion that the nomination be tendered to A. A. Letoury, which was seconded by John Lecky, Wilnot; and carried almost unanimously, there being only five voting against it. Owing to the absence of Mr. Letoury from the province the convention adjourned until the 17th in order to ascertain if he will accept the nomination or not.—S.
