ONTARIO ADVANCES LICENSE FEES AND PENALTIES.

The Ontario Government is yielding somewhat to the temperance sentiment in various ways, the latest of which is an amended license bill which increases the fees and penalties. As is well known a large part of the territorial area of the Province is under local option, in which the sale of liquors for beverage purposes is forbidden and Toronto has this year forty licenses fewer than last year. Now the fees for tavern licenses have been increased from the old figure of \$1,200 each to \$1,600 each. Shop licenses remain at \$1,000 as before. By this change the city will receive \$186,000 yearly from 110 licenses as against \$12,800 received last year from 144 licenses. The penalties for selling without license, which were but \$50 to \$100 for first offence and four months imprisonment for a second offence, have been doubled, making the fine \$100 to \$200, and for second offence the term of imprisonment made six months. Authority is also given to seize liquor in transit or in course of delivery at any wharf or railway station where the seizing officer believes the same is to be illegally sold. The owner is in such case to be notified and the onus is placed upon him to prove that such liquor was not intended for illegal sale. Persons under 21 years of age in any case, and persons of any age in cases of illegal sale, may be compelled to state from whom they purchased liquor, the penalty for refusal being imprisonment for any term not exceeding three months. Hotels in local option districts, where liquor is not allowed to be sold, are to pay a nominal license fee of \$5 each and are brought under the control of the License Board. This makes them liable to inspection at all hours, and affords opportunity to detect and punish any possible sale of liquor.

THE AIRSHIP AND THE CUSTOM HOUSE.

Major Baden Powell in a late issue of The National Review discusses the question, Will the Development of Aeroplaning End in the Abolition of the Custom House? He takes the sanguine view that in about four years time we may reasonably expect that flying will be common, that most well-to-do persons will have made a flying trip, and many will own machines and make almost daily runs. And then, of course, smuggling will be the easiest thing in the world. Of course the aeroplanes will not be able to carry more than a hundred pounds or so each, but such a weight of silks, gloves or any one of any class of very valuable commodities, if carried by a large number of flying machines, would be sufficient to impose new and heavy tasks on the customs officials and cause great loss to national revenues. A little reflection will show that this may become a most serious matter if flying machines become common. Ports, railway lines, rivers and common roads can be watched where traffic crosses the national boundaries, but who can watch the entire body of the trackless air by day and night? The idea of frontier guards against flying machines seems impracticable. Even if the air were policed with flyers, the possibility of search and detection in the air would not be possible. It has to be remembered, too, that the crossing of a frontier does not necessarily imply that the vessel is going to descend in the country it approaches. For instance, a British flyer going to Germany might want to cross over parts of Belgium and Holland. In fact, may not the object for which import duties and custom houses are established be largely defeated by the new means of travel and transportation? As is well known many nations, Canada and the United States, for instance, derive a very large share of their revenues from import duties, and should the airships of the future be made the means of successful smuggling there would be an enormous development of this sort of illicit trading across our three or more thousand miles of common frontier. The difficulty looms up as a somewhat serious one and Major Powell treats of the possibility of the nations being compelled to substitute other forms of taxation instead of the customs duties so long in vogue. Perhaps the editor of The Patriot, whose enthusiasm for airships has recently developed, may be able to devise such means for increasing the Inland Revenues of Canada that the custom houses may be closed a few years hence.

The Canadian mint is beginning to pay and will pay better in the future. Canada was well stocked with coin when the Canadian mint first got to work, and hence the showing at first was not assuring. Last year, however, the mint coined a fair quantity, especially of silver and copper coins, the profits being on gold \$13, on silver \$18,009, on specimen coins \$45, and on copper \$418,009. There is large profit in coining either silver or copper, the intrinsic value of the metal being very much less than the face value of the coins.

In a published interview Sir James Whitney, Premier of Ontario, denies having had any correspondence or expressed any opinion as to that Province, or a number of Provinces contributing one or more warships to the British navy. He does not feel that the Provinces have any duty in regard to that matter, but thinks the duty rests wholly with the federal government. Sir James went on to say:

"I have said nothing to anyone in any other Province, but I repeat, in my opinion Canada has missed an opportunity which may never come again. Had Parliament immediately and spontaneously appropriated the value of a Dreadnought, or even two, such ships, with an intimation that further aid would be forthcoming in case of need, that action, coming in concert from other British dominions, would have shown to the world at large that the British communities are ready to meet any attack upon the Empire. Such a demonstration would have cleared the atmosphere, saved further expenditure and created a lasting effect among the nations of the world who are looking on."

The Women's Municipal League of New York made a request which was granted, that the rear car in the Hudson River Tunnel trains should be reserved for women only. (The men have their smoking cars, you know.) The experiment proved a great success and the women's car was crowded, it is said, "but several women refused to ride in the special, one of them remarking that she much preferred to be where the men are."

Here is what an Italian economist, writing in The Minerva of Rome, says of Canada: "The day is not far distant when Canada, cultivated with eager industry by the robust arms of the immigrants who are crowding in, will become the granary of the world, as Egypt was of the Roman Empire." He estimates that Canada will yet be able to put upon the market an amount of grain equal to half of the world's total production which at the present does not exceed 1,500,000,000 bushels.
