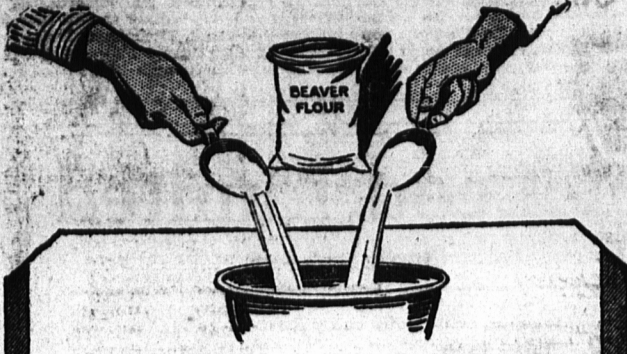


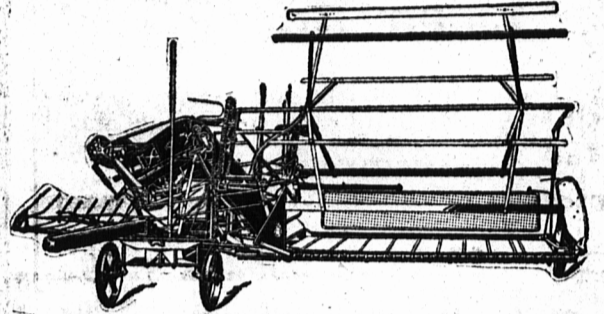

Before leaving us we beg of you, dear to accept this small token of the esteem in which your fellow members of the Teachers' Association hold you. In bidding you farewell we express the sincere hope that you will be spared to return to your family, who must deeply feel the separation, and to engage again in the educational work of the Province so dear to you. Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 8, 1916.

The gift referred to was a valuable wristlet watch in addition to another most serviceable article, a soldier's sleeping kit.

Col. Campbell replying stated that this thoughtful action on the part of the teachers was a very pleasant and unexpected surprise. He warmly thanked the donors for their gift and kind words, stating that in taking the step he had, done he was doing no more than his duty.

Colonel Ings who was next called upon was given a great ovation as he came forward. On behalf of the officers, N. C. O.'s and men he thanked the donors for their kind remarks. He declared that they were not present to pose as heroes—they were men simply doing their duty. He said they had been received everywhere with the utmost hospitality—enough to spoil some men. Later on when conditions are not so rosy they will look back upon their training days here at the most pleasant of their lives. He declared the men to be steady and sober and capable of making the finest soldiers. The men have not been kept together enough to get the spirit of comradeship and esprit de corps to be found in some regiments but that will come. The Colonel said he was already very proud of the 105th and felt that the ties of comradeship will grow stronger and stronger. "I feel a great responsibility resting upon my shoulders," said the Colonel. "In taking over these 1200 men. They look to me to look after them. I feel I have the support of my officers who are all strong, intelligent men. At this particular time a feeling of sadness comes over one as the day of our departure from our Island home approaches. The relatives at home are the ones who will need sympathy. There is a certain exhilaration and excitement about the soldier's life which makes one forget their troubles and difficulties. Those left at home are the ones who will need your consideration and sympathy." The Colonel concluded by thanking all who had been so kind to the Regiment while here.

The proceedings broke up with cheers for the King, the Lieut Governor, the 105th, and the rendition of the National Anthem by the Band.

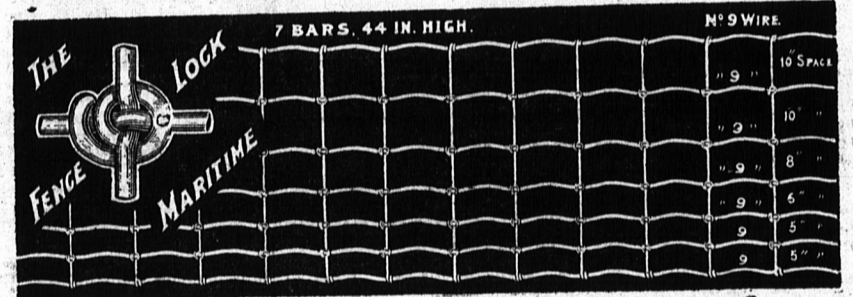
