

Williams, Red Sox Hitter Finishes Season With Mark Over 400, First Since 1923

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—Sid Hudson blanked the Yankees with four hits to gain his 13th victory in the final game of the season today as Washington Senators defeated the American League champions, 5-0.

Ted Williams of Boston Red Sox became the first American leaguer to hit 400 for a season since 1923 when Harry Hellman batted .408 for Detroit. Bill was the last National League player to turn the trick, batting .401 for the Giants in 1930.

Making six hits in eight times at bat while the Red Sox and Athletics split a doubleheader, Williams finished with a mark of .4057. Boston won the first game 12-11

and the second was called on account of darkness after eight innings with the A's on top, 7-1.

At St. Louis, the Browns, whose chief claim to fame is the trouble they cause first-division teams, retained this good form by defeating Cleveland Indians, 5-4, and knocking them out of a chance to pocket the league's fourth-place money.

At Detroit, Chicago White Sox won third place in the final league standings as Lefty Thornton Lee shut out the challenging Tigers 2-0.

The champion Yankees were nosed out 4-3 by Senators Saturday.

In the other league games Boston beat Philadelphia 5-1, Chicago topped Detroit 10-6, and Cleveland edged out St. Louis.

Capacity crowd Expected for Series opener

NEW YORK, Sept. 28 (AP)—The warmup for the World Series between Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Yankees began quietly today where the regular season left off.

This will be the sixth "subway series" for New York and even the presence of the Dodgers, giving the show a new star, was not enough to stir the Sunday calm.

The storm will strike soon enough. The Dodgers prepared for it tonight by moving en masse into a Manhattan hotel where they hope to find a little more peace and quiet than will be possible in the borough of Brooklyn for the next week or two.

It was quiet across the river in Flatbush today, too, but tomorrow they are planning a mammoth celebration centred around a parade and there will be plenty of steam for the series from there on.

The first game at Yankee Stadium Wednesday at 2:30 p. m. W.S.T. may attract a capacity crowd of about 70,000 for the biggest turnout in the history of the series.

All reserved seats for the games at the Stadium were sold out weeks ago and the tickets for Brooklyn share of the series in Ebbets Field, which seats only 32,000, were gobbled up as soon as they were placed on sale a few days ago.

The Yankees were favorites 1 to 2 while the Dodgers opened at 12 to 5. These long odds on the Dodgers caused the early rush of money and they were expected to shorten before the series opens.

Flatbushers Attain 100th Victory By Defeating The Phillies 5-1 Yesterday

BROOKLYN, Sept. 28 (AP)—Before a crowd of 12,870, Brooklyn Dodgers brought their pennant-winning National League campaign to a satisfactory conclusion today by beating the Phillies, 5-1 for their 100th victory of the year. It was the first time any Brooklyn club had attained that figure.

At Chicago St. Louis Cardinals closed the baseball season with a 3-1 victory over Cubs. Eddie Beazley, rookie pitcher from New Orleans, made a successful major league debut with a 10-hit performance.

At Pittsburgh Pirate rookie Bill Clemensen stopped Bucky Walters bid for his 20th victory as Pirate defeated Cincinnati 3-2.

At Boston, Dave Koslo, rookie New York Giant hurler, threw a six-hit performance at Braves and his team closed the season with a 2-1 victory.

Playing their first game after winning the pennant, Dodgers suffered a 7-3 trouncing from Philadelphia's Phillies Saturday.

In the other Saturday games Boston nosed out Giants 5-4, Cincinnati trounced Pittsburgh 15-9, and Chicago defeated St. Louis Cards 6-5.

Argos beat Beaches 9-6

Montreal team Lead series 2-1

MONTREAL, Sept. 28 (CP)—Montreal Royals moved into the Little World Series lead again here this afternoon, when they rallied for seven runs in the sixth inning to defeat Columbus Red Birds, 9-6.

The teams now move to Columbus for the remaining games in the best-of-seven series, which begin tomorrow night.

Displaying the power which gave them the first game Friday, 12-6, the Royals broke into their hitting rash with seven runs in the big inning to sew up the contest. 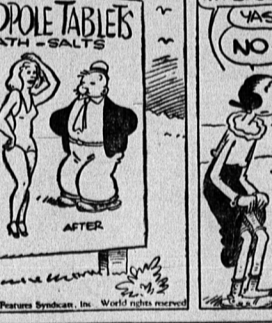
