C. N. R. President Strongly Supports Loan Campaign

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 9—Calling all men and women in the employ of the Canadian National Railways to subscribe generously to the third Victory Loan and by so doing to exceed their excellent record established in the second Victory Loan, R. C. Vaughan, Chairman and President of the National Railways System, has prepared a special message for distribution to all employees in Canada, text of which was announced at headquarters here.

In his message to the staff Mr. Vaughan says "The New Victory Loan subscription is about to open. In deciding how much we can subscribe, let us all keep in mind the fact that Canada is in the fourth year of the greatest war in all history—a year different from all other wars fought during the last thousand years. It is not only a war of arms and munitions, it is a death struggle with our freedom at stake. We as Canadians are apart from all other Canadians in this war to save ourselves.

In accordance with the terms of the Geneva convention, the commissioned officers are held in camps of their own, separate from those of their ranks. Officers are not required to work although they may be.

The men and women of the Canadian National Railways subscribed nearly \$5,000,000 to the Victory Loan Campaign earlier this year and, in addition, more than 43,000 of our workers are purchasing War Savings Certificates regularly. Let the number of Canadian National men and women subscribers

Reprisals May Be Taken Against Nazi Prisoners

OTTAWA, Oct. 9—(CP)—The United Kingdom and Canadian government are holding "urgent consultations" regarding possible reprisals for the German manhandling of Canadian and British prisoners captured at Dieppe an external affairs department spokesman said today at a press conference.

The Berlin radio announced today that prisoners taken at Dieppe had been manhandled since noon claiming that was in reprisal for similar treatment of captured Nazis.

The departmental spokesman said here that no decision has been reached as to any reprisal steps against the thousands of German prisoners held in Canada.

Despatches from London said the British government, in a reply to the German action, threatened to bind the hands of German prisoners in British hands, up to the number of Canadian and British taken prisoner at Dieppe.

Almost all the Germans held as prisoners in Canada were captured by British troops in the reprisal was a matter in which the United Kingdom would have an important role.

The majority of prisoners taken by the Nazis at Dieppe were Canadian. Consequently, the Canadian government was particularly disturbed by the Berlin radio report, he added.

An exact number of Canadians taken prisoner at Dieppe is not known, since the Germans are not known to have forwarded an official list. However, the International Red Cross at Geneva, more than 2,500 Canadians were reported missing after the battle, however a considerable proportion are believed to be in custody in Germany.

Thousands of prisoners of war—the exact number is kept secret—are confined in camps in Canada and most of them are believed to be Germans. They include submarine men, airmen and soldiers, a considerable number of whom were brought from the north African battle zone.

Prisoners Well Treated

In the treatment of these prisoners Canada has adhered strictly to the terms of the Geneva convention. Prisoners receive the same rations and quarters as Canadian soldiers, and these are believed to be as good or better than those received by any soldiers in the world.

The first large movement of prisoners to Canada started during the summer of 1940, after the fall of France. With an invasion attempt against the British Isles anticipated Canada agreed to take charge of a large number of prisoners held there. It was feared they would be a source of danger in the event of a German attack.

Prior to that, Canadian internment camps had been mainly for the confinement of civilians—both enemy nationals and Canadians—who were considered a danger to the state. The enemy nationals were those Germans and Italians resident in Canada who were brought to a place of internment.

The bringing of number of combatants from overseas necessitated construction of a number of prisoner camps scattered throughout the country. Most of them are comparatively inaccessible spots in northern Ontario and western Canada.

Although there have been a considerable number of escapes and attempted escapes from camps in Canada, so far one prisoner, Baron Franz von Werra, a German airman has succeeded in making his way to freedom and returning to Germany. He was subsequently reported killed in action. All others who were killed during pursuit of the job of guarding the prisoner camps has been performed by the Veterans' Guard and the custody of the prisoners during transit is the responsibility of the Canadian Provost Corps.

In his letter, Mr. Vaughan gives the approval of the method by which members of the staff throughout the Dominion will act as "Bond Salesmen" and solicit their fellow employees to make purchases of the Victory Bonds. The President also states that bonds may be purchased by means of payroll deductions.

Famous N. B. Captain Dies

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Oct. 8—(CP)—Capt. Arthur Wesley Burns, colorful figure of Saint John windjammer days, died unexpectedly at his home here today. He had appeared in good health until a few minutes before his death. He was born at Dieby, N.S., a son of the late Capt. George and Louisa (Titus) Burns.

Capt. Burns spent 29 years under sail and 27 in steam, mostly as master. His voyages took him all over the world, and he was as familiar with foreign shores as with his native Nova Scotia.

When skipper of the Canadian Government steamship Landdowne he and his crew saved those aboard the liner Cobecould after she ran aground on Trinity ledge in the Bay of Fundy. For his achievement the Captain was presented with a gold watch and chain.

Earlier in his career Capt. Burns picked up a large vessel whose crew had died of fever, excepting the mate and two men. The diseased stricken ship was towed 1,200 miles to Batavia, netting the salaried skipper a tidy sum.

He is survived by his widow, one son, Fred, at Halifax, and two daughters, Louise and Ola, nurses at Providence, R. I. His only daughter was born on one of his ships during a voyage across the Indian Ocean.
