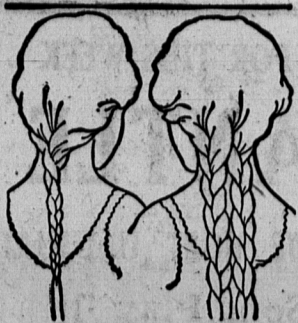

SYDNEY POLICE THREATENED TO SHOOT

Sailors Who Demanded the Release of Two of Their Comrades Who Had Been Arrested

SYDNEY, N.S., May 31.—Nipped by the police before any damage was done, a repetition of the recent Halifax trouble was averted last night. The threat of the Chief of Police to protect the City Hall at the expense even of lives was the means of lampening the ardor of a crowd of sailors who filled the street in front of the police station and demanded the release of two of their comrades who had been arrested. "We will fire on any one who attempts to storm the building and the cartridges will not be blank," Chief McCormack told the crowd as he stepped out of an automobile which carried him to the scene. The event which caused the near riot was the arrest of a returned soldier on a charge of being drunk.

Telling the story, Officer McLeod, who made the arrest, stated that the soldier was on Charlotte street, near Townsend street. On placing him under arrest, a number of sailors interfered. One of them jumped on his back. During the scuffle the soldier got away, but a sailor was arrested and taken to the police station. Led by one of the number, the sailors approached the entrance to the building and demanded the release of their comrades, according to information obtained. There were but three officers and they drew their revolvers, which had the effect of stopping the attempt.
