TALES TOLD BY MEN IN FIGHTING LINES ON LAND AND SEA

What may be called the first Canadian letter from the British front reached London last week. It is addressed to Mrs. Carey by her son, Geoffrey, a member of the Canadian Pacific Staff in London, who is now with the forces on the Continent as an interpreter. Mrs. Carey has three sons, all of whom have joined the colors and have been in the Canadian Pacific service.

Sunday, August 30.
My Dearest Mother,—I have a sense of humorous satisfaction in launching a "bolt from the blue." Je suis en l'air; mais est-ce un gros tout ce que je puis vous dire. For obvious reasons I cannot disclose my whereabouts or very much news, and my letter must be short, or it won't go through. I came over via S—, had a very bad night on a coil of rope, and in the evening I and several other chaps became disconnected from the column together with the supplies and baggage which we were in charge of. We had an adventurous camp life for two days and nights, and then managed to report ourselves to the right quarter. If I had not known French we should have been retained at one of the bases, and my surroundings are very interesting. We all sleep anywhere in the open air and eat the plainest of food; but no one thinks of grumbling. We are much better off than the French troops. We are continually being shifted about at extremely short notice; but the organization of everything—transport of horses, supplies, ammunition, camps with electric light, men's quarters giving everything satisfaction, and so on.... it is really marvellous. Everything runs smoothly and quickly, and all of us are in the best of spirits. Sometimes we are fortunate enough to get a paper and sometimes to get to town. I was not paid before going, neither have I any pay book, so that I possess at present just a few sous. There are really lots of small articles which we cannot do without, such as bread (we get tired of biscuits) milk (for our tea is strong), papers, drinks during the heat, etc., and as prices are up our sous are treasures. However, we pull along very well, and if you don't often hear from me, please don't get anxious, as I cannot always communicate. We are received here as heroes, and are greeted in broken English by almost every passer-by, especially the children. On several occasions kind people have called us in and supplied us with free drinks and fruit.

ships out here, and last night the Bristol fired on one, but she was a very fast boat, and ran away out of sight. We caught her coaling from a merchant ship, but before we could get in range of her she was off, steaming twenty-seven knots, and as we can only do twenty-two you see we were handicapped; but, nevertheless, all are quite confident that if we do drop across her fair and square we shall sink her in about ten minutes. But the worst of it is she keeps running away. Dear mother and father I don't want you to worry about me and if anything does happen and we all get killed you will always be proud to say that your son died with a good heart, fighting for King and country, and who could die a better death? I am not a bit worried myself, and the excitement is great.

AN OFFICER'S WARNING

A young officer who has seen the whole course of the campaign from the landing of the British troops writes:— I wish you would try to make the people of England understand that they should be most exceedingly thankful that they are living on an island and not in the midst of the dreadful things which are happening on the Continent. Do enforce upon the public that England must fight this thing out, and must conquer even if it has to spend the blood of its young men like water. It will be far better that every family throughout England should have to sorrow for one of its members than that England should have to go through similar ordeals to those which Continental countries are suffering.

The sight of old women and men fleeing from village to village; young mothers with babies in arms with their few personal effects on their backs, or in some more fortunate cases with their goods and chattels stowed away in an old farm cart, drawn by a nag too venerable to be of service to the State; this is what one has seen daily.

Picture to yourself our night marches with the burning villages on all sides set fire to by German shells, and the Germans have been rather careless whether their shells struck fortified and defended positions or open ones. In some cases the fires were caused intentionally by marauding patrols.

Do not imagine that things are not going well with us. We are all satisfied and confident of the end; but at the same time the only possible end can be gained by sacrifice on the part of those at home only. All is well with me personally; have a busy time, but it is most interesting work.

"WE MADE NO MISTAKE"

A Coldstream Guardsman, writing of the fighting near the forest of Compiègne, compares the sight of the Germans issuing from the trees to a cup final crowd at the Crystal Palace.

"You couldn't miss them. Our bullets ploughed into them, but still they came for us. I was well entrenched and my rifle got so hot I could hardly hold it. I was wondering if I should have enough bullets when a pal shouted, 'Up Guards and at 'em!' The next second he was rolled over with a nasty knock on the shoulder. He jumped up and hissed, 'Let me get at them!' His language was a bit stronger than that.

"When we really did get the order to get at them we made no mistake. I can tell you. They cringed at the bayonet, but those on our left wing tried to get round us, and after racing as hard as we could for quite three hundred yards we cut up nearly every man who did not run away."

Referring to the cavalry, he writes: "You have read of the charge of the Light Brigade. It was nothing to our chaps. I saw two of our fellows who were unhorsed stand with their swords, bring down nine or ten of the pan-stricken devils. Then they got hold of the stirrup-straps of a horse with out a rider and got out of the melee. This kind of thing was going on all day."

"In the afternoon I thought we should all get bowled over, as my game for us again in their big numbers. Where they came from, goodness knows; but as we could not stop them with bullets they had another taste of the bayonet. My captain, a fine fellow, was near me, and as he fetched them down, he shouted, 'Give them socks, my lads!' How many were killed and wounded I don't know; but the field was covered with them."

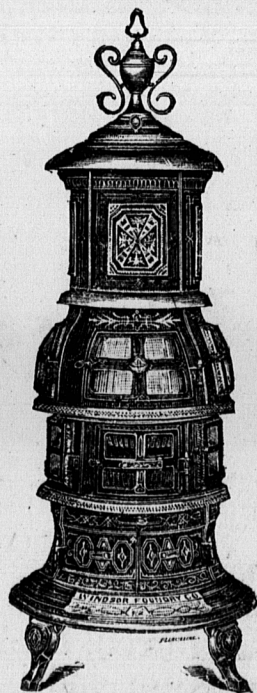

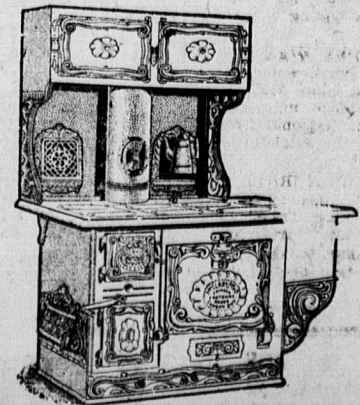
