FACTS ABOUT ALCOHOL

The following are a few facts about alcohol which I have gathered from the "Advancement of Science" set up by the "Research Council on Problems of Alcohol." Here are some scientific truths they have found about alcohol:

1. Alcohol in any form will not help cure a cold.

2. Exercise will not hasten the "wearing off" of liquor.

3. Alcohol is a definite factor in the aggravation of heart disease and more drinkers die of heart ailments than of any other cause.

4. Liquor does not warm up the body but actually chills you. The seeming warmth following a few drinks results from a rush of blood to the skin.

5. After a single drink of hard liquor, your chances as a driver of hitting a pedestrian or another car are 55 times greater than before taking the drink.

6. Alcohol in the form of hard liquor now ranks high as a cause of mental disorders and our asylums are filling up with liquor victims.

7. Distilled alcohol is the only habit-forming drug that can be bought openly by any adult.

8. Today, one out of every 10 patients admitted for the first time to the mental hospitals of this continent are insane because of drinking.

Heavy Damage In Jewish Institute

MONTREAL, June 24 — (CP) — Heavy damage was caused today to the Baron de Hirsch Institute, Jewish Philanthropic centre, when fire of unknown origin broke out in the roof and spread to the upper floors.

Main damage was to the various departments in the building which houses the offices of the federation of Jewish Philanthropies. Suffering loss were the family welfare department, child welfare Bureau, legal aid department, clothing room and offices of the executives of administration.

Loss estimated at \$1,200 was caused to the clothing department alone, where huge piles of clothing were waiting shipment tomorrow to a camp for children. The clothing had arrived late yesterday.
