AN INTERESTING RELIC

Part of Sir Isaac Newton's Apple Tree Preserved

Future visitors to London, who go to Burlington House to see the piece of Isaac Newton's apple tree which was presented to the Royal Astronomical Society recently need be troubled by no doubts as to its genuineness. Seldom, in fact, has a relic of such interest been so clearly authenticated as this bit of the apple tree that grew in Newton's garden and the falling of the fruit from which suggested to him the idea of gravitation.

The tiny log, which now reposes in a glass case, is about two and a half inches in diameter and three inches in width. It does not look like the wood of an apple tree, but at Kew, where it was microscopically examined, its character was vindicated and it was proved unquestionably to be part of an apple tree. The story of the log is told in detail, moreover, by Charles William Walker, the member of the Royal Astronomical Society who presented it to that distinguished body.

"It is," he says, "a piece of the apple tree at Woolsthorpe, the home of Sir Isaac Newton. The history of this piece of wood and the way in which I came to have it is as follows: "My father, Richard Walker, was born at Bradmore, Nottinghamshire, at the Manor farm there in 1907. He went to school when he was ten or twelve years of age to a clergyman at Stoke, Lincolnshire, named Pearson. My father told me that while he was at school there was a very wild wind storm one night, and that in the morning news came that Sir Isaac Newton's apple tree had been blown down at Woolsthorpe. The schoolmaster, Mr. Pearson, and several of the boys at once set off for Woolsthorpe, where Sir Isaac Newton's house was, and which is not far from Stoke, which is on the Lincolnshire side of Belvoir castle.

"When they arrived there they saw the old apple tree lying on the ground. It had been propped up all round for very many years, and every effort had been made to preserve it. My father said he did not know by what authority Mr. Pearson acted, but the schoolmaster obtained a saw from somewhere and sawed a good many logs of wood from the branches. My father got one of these pieces, which he always kept as being of great interest. Many times he was asked to part with it, but always refused. My father showed the piece of wood to me and told me all the circumstances under which he got it. There cannot be the least doubt that it came into his possession in the way I have described."

When Richard Walker died the little relic passed to the son, and it was long his desire to place the historic scrap of wood in a safe place.

LIFETIME IN WORKHOUSE

Woman and Family Who Have Cost London Ratepayers \$6,770.

In a City of London Guardians' report, appeared a striking instance of how the ratepayers' money is spent in supporting other people's families.

A woman who was born in 1860 became a charge on the city two years later. She spent fifteen years at the Hanwell Schools, and then a situation was found for her as a servant in Kensington. She stayed there for a fortnight, and then returned to Hanwell.

Another situation was secured for her at Herne Hill, and she spent fourteen months there, afterwards going into the City Workhouse. Since that time she has been in and out four hundred times.

She has had five children, three of whom have been educated at the expense of the ratepayers. The other two died. The woman and her children cost the ratepayers \$6,770 in all to date.

King George Gives Medals.

The King presented to the Royal United Service Institute in Whitehall, a number of valuable medals, including Queen Victoria's jubilee medal of 1887, the diamond jubilee medal of 1897, King Edward VII. coronation medal, 1911, and the Royal Victorian medals issued by Queen Victoria, King Edward and King George.

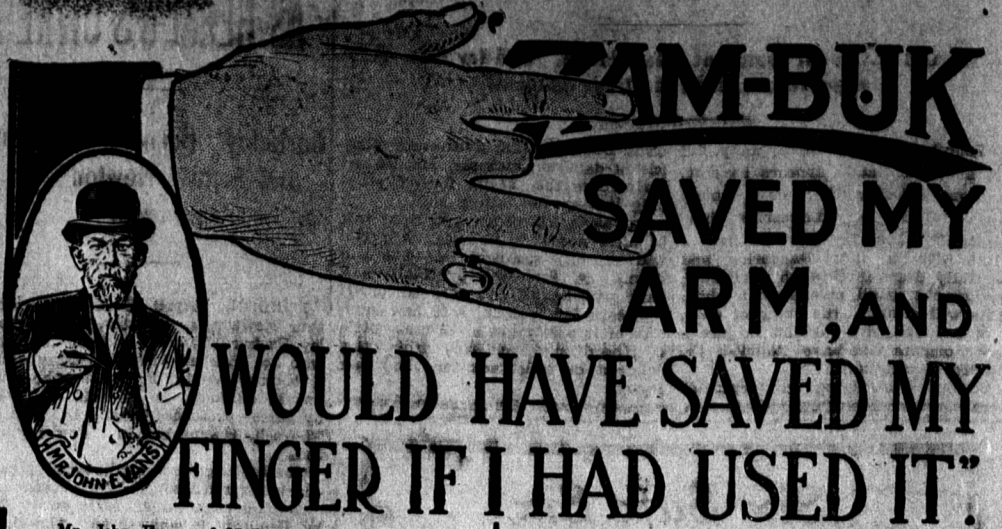
