The light has been installed by the Dominion Government to increase the power and efficiency of the station.

FOR PROTECTION OF SAILORS

TORONTO, Nov. 14.—The recent disasters on the Great Lakes inspired R. R. Gamey, M. P., of Manitoulin, to investigate the lack of protection for sailors.

At the next session of the Legislature there will be sought a place on the statute books of Ontario for provision for the protection of sailors and employees of sailing vessels and steamers of all kinds.

Mr. Gamey, speaking of the great loss of life in the recent storm, said that sailing was about the only calling where no effort is made to protect human life.

EDISON'S RIVAL

Edison has a rival, a woman inventor, whose activities have kept pace remarkably with his in the realms of applied science, and she is an American woman too.

Miss Margaret E. Knight, of Boston, celebrated her golden anniversary of invention several years ago. She was born in Maine, but her family, when she was twelve years old, moved to Manchester, N. H. There her two brothers worked in cotton mills. There Margaret made her first invention, a contrivance that prevented the shuttles from falling from the looms and injuring the workers. She thought it out because a school chum of hers was badly hurt by a falling shuttle, and she wanted to prevent such an accident from ever happening again. That shuttle guard hasn't been improved upon yet.

Forty years she became known throughout New England under the curious sobriquet of "Paper Bag Margie Knight." That was because in 1871, she invented a machine for making and folding square-bottomed paper bags. They are known the world over, and it was on that invention that she became the first American woman patentee, as well as the first American woman to receive the great seal of England, to receive a French patent or to receive a German patent.

She has taken out 87 patents of her own, mostly on engines and her inventions cover all types, including steam turbines and internal combustion engines.

She is 68 years old now, and Edison, as a steady workman—who has to take a rest whether he needs it or not—hasn't anything on her record, for she is in her machine shop every day, and she can handle a lathe as well as any of her helpers.

HURTA FACES BANKRUPTCY

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 14.—Portugal and Bulgaria are added to the list of countries whose governments have given recognition to Provisional President Huerta, over Ouendo Moherro, the Mexican Minister for Foreign Affairs today announced in autograph letters received from these countries.

Huerta's counsellors, who expressed themselves as anxious for the opening of negotiations with Washington, received no intimation up till one o'clock this afternoon of President Wilson's willingness.

SOME FARM

Takes Five Days To Ride Around It on Horse-Back.

The farm of Joseph O. Thompson, outside of Birmingham, Ala., is said to be one of the largest in the world. It comprises 25,000 acres in the famous black belt, which is considered the most fertile farm land to be found anywhere. If this farm was to be cut into city lots there would be 490,000 enough to build a city of 2,400,000 inhabitants, figuring six to each family. Two hundred miles of wire encloses the farm. It takes the man who inspects the fence five days to ride around it on horseback. To properly care for the farm 1,200 are employed, who with their families make a population larger than the average Alabama city. Two hundred and thirty ploughs are always in use.

All the farm is not under cultivation. Just now only 6,000 acres are planted. In an ordinary season this area yields 2,500 bales of cotton, 25,000 bushels of corn, 12,000 bushels of oats and 13,000 tons of alfalfa. Besides all this there are on the farm 600 head of cattle and nearly as many hogs.

Mr. Thompson is called the King farmer of Alabama. There are cattle men in the west and in other parts of the world who own more acres, but they are merely pasture and not farms.

THE WORK OF A TEN-DOLLAR BILL
